

FAMOUS COMEDY IS COMING WEDNESDAY

"Lightnin'" by Frank Bacon, Said Most Interesting Play of Years

Easily the most eagerly awaited theatrical offering of the generation, "Lightnin'" will at last come within easy reach of this city's playgoers when it is presented at the Heilig theatre on Wednesday, October 14.

An all-star cast, headed by Mrs. Frank Bacon, Thomas Jefferson, son of the late Joseph Jefferson, and Bessie Bacon, daughter of the late Frank Bacon, has been assembled by John Goldsmith to introduce the record smash to the principal cities on tour, on the fact that this city has been included in the route is something to be genuinely thankful for. The production was staged by Winchell Smith.

"Lightnin'" is described as a play remarkably true in its tones and fine in its appeal, with an abundance of humor of the clean sort. Touching the heart with many a shaft of tender feeling, this famous comedy is woven around a character as gentle and lovable as has graced the American stage since the days of Jefferson's "Rip Van Winkle." In fact, so human and ingratiating is "Lightnin'" Bill, the tipping old soldier and hotel man of the California-Nevada border, that it is said that an hour of him makes him the acquaintance of a lifetime.

Bill Jones has been ironically nicknamed "Lightnin'" because he is so slow about everything he sets out to do. A prevaricating and shiftless old relic of the Civil War, he has, early in life, to hear him tell it, crossed the plains in the dead of winter, driving before him a swarm of bees, without losing a single bee. He has a small pension which usually goes for liquor, and he lives on the bounty of his drudging wife. When necessary for him to work, he performs with great deliberation and much postponement the small chores around the hotel, accipied chiefly with discontented wives awaiting such liberty as the Nevada divorce laws can bestow upon them.

"Lightnin'" is a winning old chap, though soft of speech, gently boastful, professing knowledge of everything and as full of quaint lies as it is possible to be. He would be a fast friend and never a dangerous enemy. A pathetic figure, this poor old man, but capable of provoking laughter as readily as he starts the tears; and from a character of this type, there is no escape in the theater.
