**SKY LINE OFFERS ATTRACTIVE VIEW**

Manager of Famous Walnut Orchards Is Advocate of More County Road

Mose P. Adams, manager of the Skyline Walnut Orchards, southwest of Liberty, reported at the Chamber of Commerce Friday that a great number of people drive down in that part of the country, attracted by the view of the orchard. They drive on down to the end of the road, apparently not realizing that it does not continue, and as a result have no little difficulty in turning around. Mr. Adams said that it is even necessary for him to help them turn around at times, and also to furnish them with gas when they run out of their supply at that point.

The district is entitled to a good road, he believes, and according to his estimate, about another mile of road would solve the problem. That would bring the road out onto a good dirt road which is in turn connected with the highway.

From the Skyline orchard, it is declared, a finer view can be obtained of the Cascade range than from any other point in Marion county. There are four or five snow-capped peaks visible from the orchard. It is thought that if the extra mile of road should be put in, so that motorists would no longer have to make the inconvenient turning around, travel would greatly increase, and would serve as an incentive to bring tourists to the location.

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## WORLD COURT PLAN FAVORED BY HALE

Dean of University of Oregon Law School Is Speaker for Lions Friday

Dean Hale of the University of Oregon law school expressed himself as being heartily in favor of the world court of the league of nations, and America's entry into it, when he addressed the Lions at their weekly luncheon Friday.

It is Dean Hale's opinion that the world court is a great step toward the abolishing of war, and he declared that inasmuch as the court is largely the creation of America, it is hard to understand how the country can stay out.

Dean Hale went back into history to 1899, at the forming of The Hague tribunal, in order to trace the development of the world court, and brought out the fact that there are now 48 nations belonging to the court. He declared:

"Before we can find a way to peace there must be a will for peace." He expressed the belief that "international psychology" is largely responsible for the continuance or the cessation of war.
