### Griffith-Ford Wedding

No more beautiful wedding has ever been solemnized in a Salem home than that which took place at 8 o'clock last night, October 17, when Miss Margaret Griffith, elder daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L. F. Griffith, became the bride of Mr. Bert T. Ford, the only son of Mr. and Mrs. T. K. Ford of this city. The wedding united two of the valley's most prominent families, and a large number of attractive social affairs have taken place in the bride-elect's honor since the engagement was announced in September at a charmingly appointed bridge luncheon.

One hundred and twenty-five friends and relatives witnessed the impressive service as it was read last night by Rev. T. V. Keenan in the living room. One entire corner of the room was transformed into an altar by means of blossoms and candles. The altar, itself, above the prayer bench, carried a silver candelabra with three white tapers. In the immediate background higher tiers of pure white cathedral candles burned. A screen of smilax, with ropes of white asters, made the background, with ferns, palms and tall, pedestal baskets of snowball chrysanthemums banded profusely on either side. The fireplace in the opposite corner was filled with Oregon grapes and potted ferns while lavender Michelmas daisies and rose-pink gladioli combined in a low green basket. Here and there about the room floor baskets of orchid-pink and snowball chrysanthemums were arranged, while in the rooms and hallway beyond the color scheme merged into the deeper, richer tints of autumn, with the other two fireplaces banked in the same manner as the one in the living room. Delphinium, French marigolds, dahlias, asters and gladioli in hanging baskets and floor baskets gave a festive floral note to the entire house.

Mendelssohn's wedding march, with Miss Gretchen Brown at the piano, was the processional used, the bride approaching the altar on

the arm of her father. The stairway down which she came was intertwined with smilax and white satin ribbons. Her only attendant was her sister, Miss Ruth Griffith, Frank Durbin, Jr., attended the groom as best man. The bride was exquisitely lovely in her bridal gown of delicate chiffon, worn with a flowing, court train. The dress, with a double-tiered circular skirt, was bordered about both skirts with a deep row of small pearls set in medallions. The same border was repeated on the bodice. A chiffon tie fell from the shoulders in the back. The bride's veil was secured with a priceless bandeau of rich rose-point lace with orange blossoms completing the head dress. The bride's bouquet was a beautiful shower of Ophelia and white roses with an exotic orchid in the center—which went to her mother before the bouquet was thrown. The bouquet was tied with fine pink and white satin streamers.

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In her hand the bride carried a dainty lace handkerchief made by her mother 27 years ago. Her pumps were of silver kid.

The only attendant, Miss Ruth Griffith, as maid of honor for her sister, wore a gown in dawn georgette with a petaled skirt and a bodice with the entire surface delicately embroidered in silver and iridescent beads combined with ravishing effect. Her bouquet was of pink butterfly roses and lavender-tinted scabiosa. Preceding the reading of the service Miss Mary Jane Albert sang "For You Alone."

The bride's mother, Mrs. L. F. Griffith, was gifted for the occasion in a beautiful mode of poude blue chiffon and beaded gold brocade lace. A reception followed immediately after the ceremony. The dining room was perfect in its appointments for the evening. Or-gandie over the linen surface of the tablecloth created a surprisingly beautiful effect. A long, low basket of deep-pink butterfly roses centered the table with wavy streamers of smilax reaching from the ceiling fixture to the four sides of the table. Four tall pink tapers burned in silver holders while on the mantel six tall can-

dies were arranged among roses. Presiding at the urns and cutting the ices were Mrs. J. E. Flanders of Portland, Mrs. A. W. Giesy, Mrs. Charles G. Robertson and Miss Loretta Ford. Assisting in the serving were Miss Dorothy Patterson, Miss Maxine Buren, Miss Josephine Baumgartner, Miss Joy Johnson of Cottage Grove, Mrs. Alfred McClintock of Weed, Cal., and Miss Dorothy McKee of Portland. Metschan of Portland, and a cousin of the bride, received the guests at the door. The bride received a host of beautiful gifts in silver, cut glass, electric fixtures and linen which were on display on the second floor.

During the reception Mr. and Mrs. Ford left for a ten-day motor trip into British Columbia. The bride's going-away costume was an ensemble suit of rich blue Polret twill, with Siberian squirrel trimming. She wore a lovely small hat in harmony. All her accessories were in gray.
