New Al Smith Presidential Boom Seen Under Way



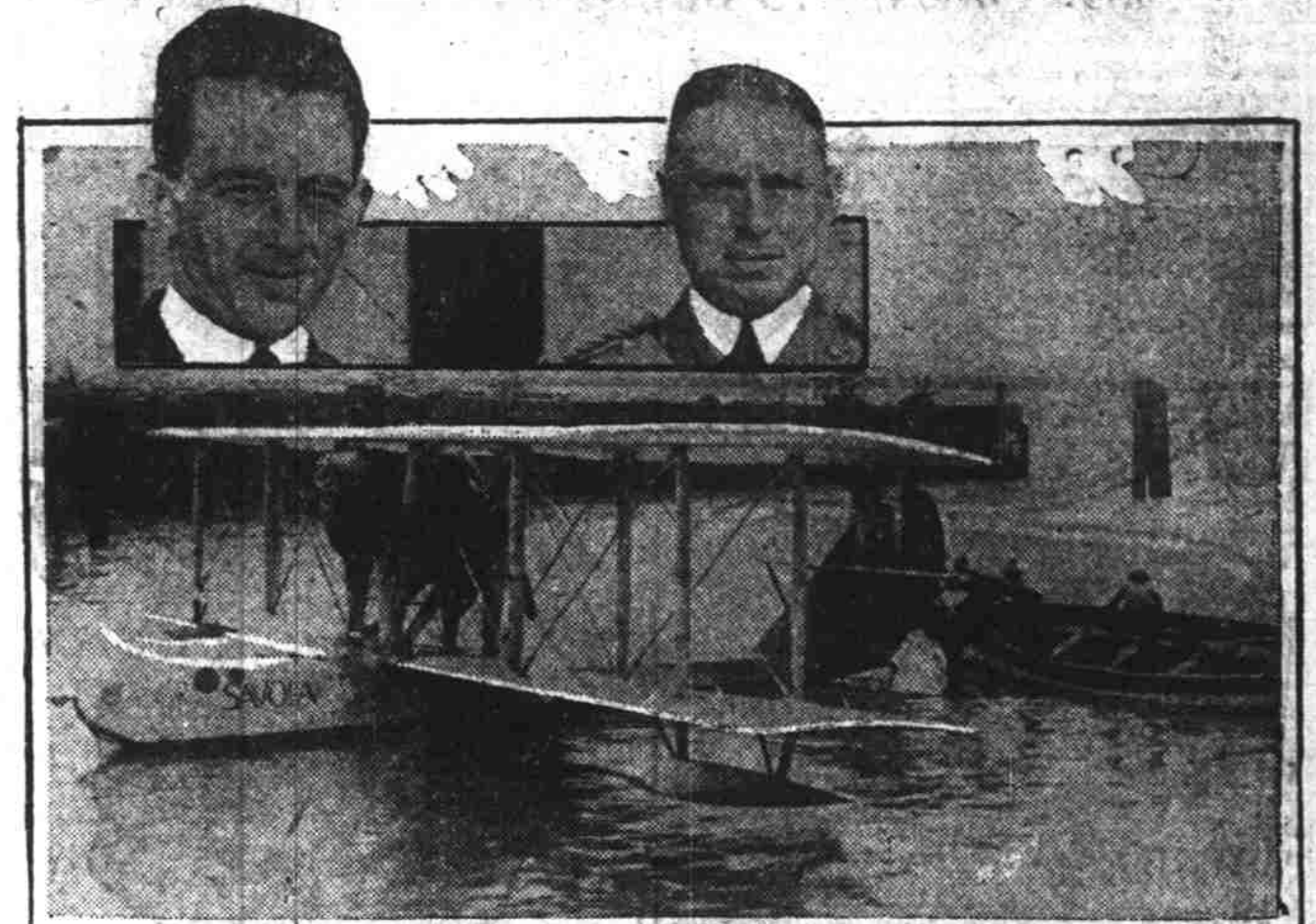

Green Gets O. K. of Union Labor



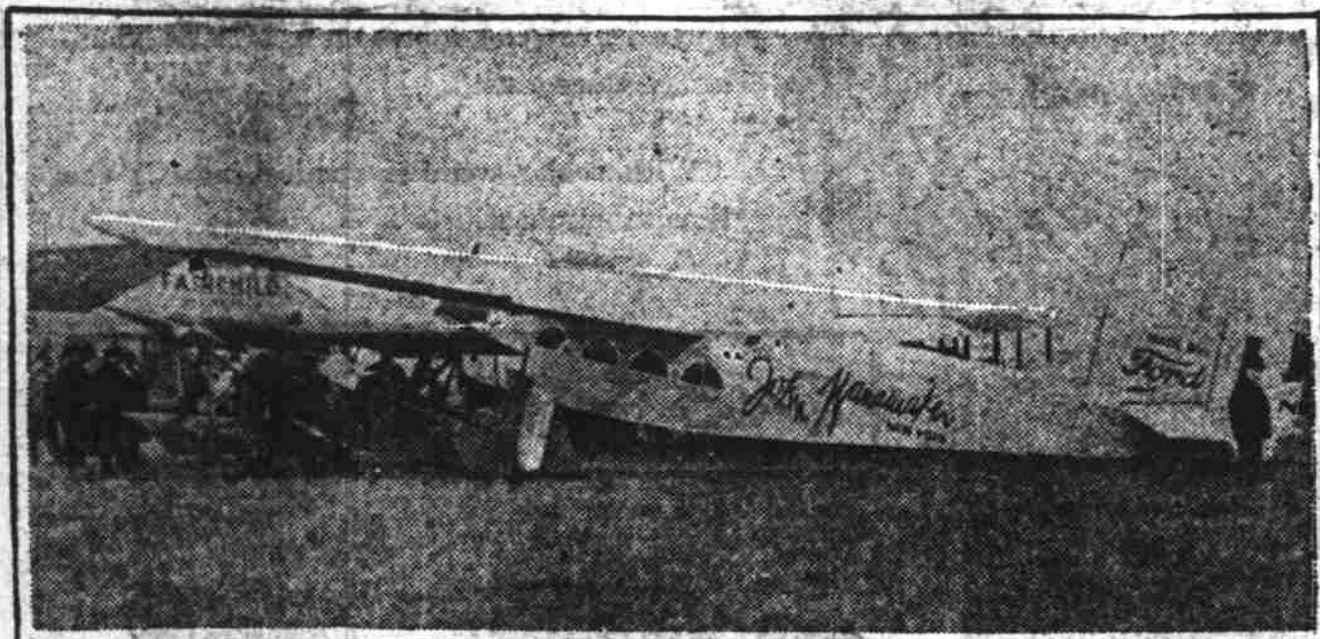
William Green, new president of American Federation of Labor, has the solid support of union labor of the country, the approval given his leadership in annual convention at Atlantic City indicates.

Department Store Selling Ford Planes Over Counter



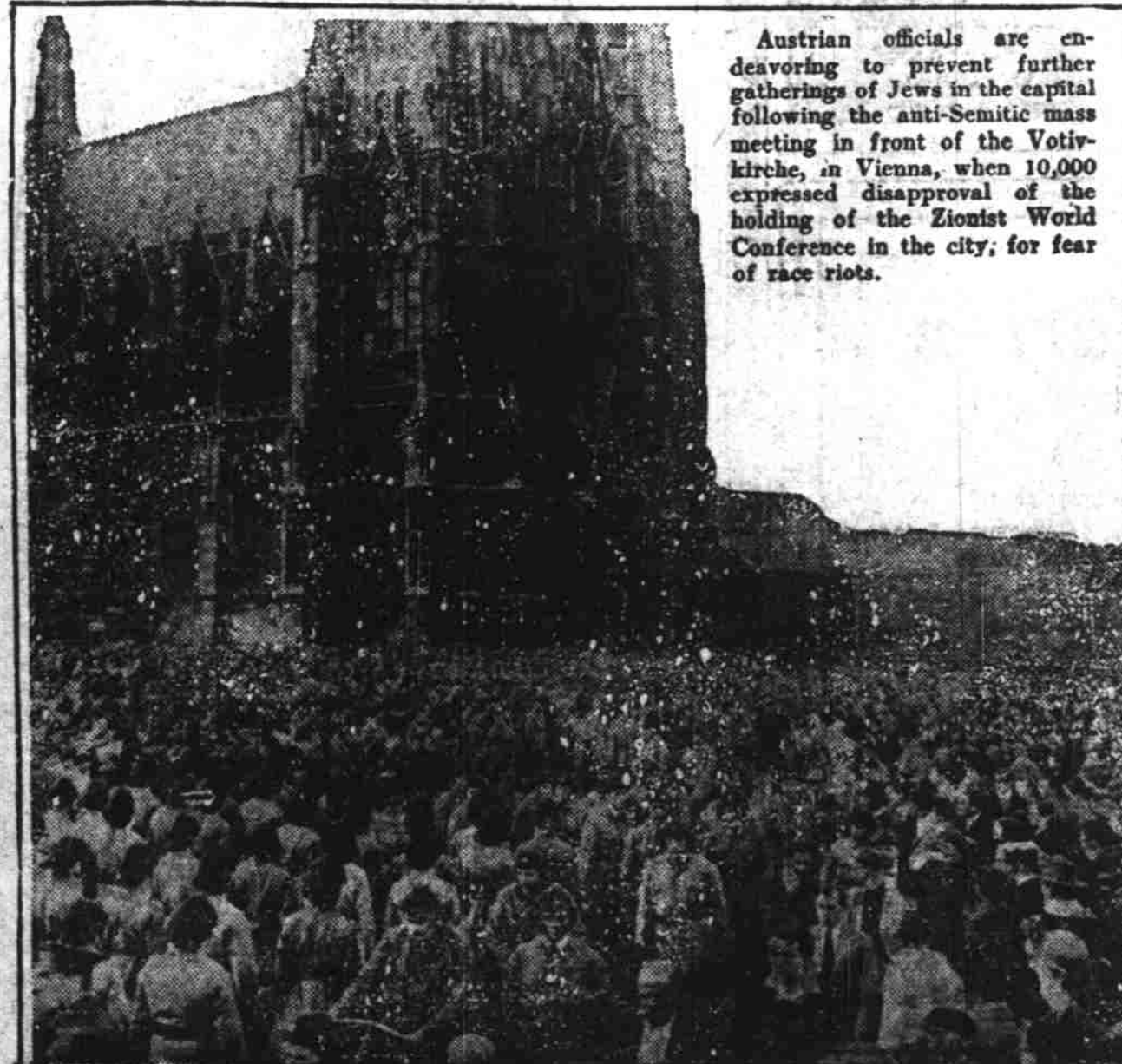

Anti-Semitic Riots Threatened in Vienna



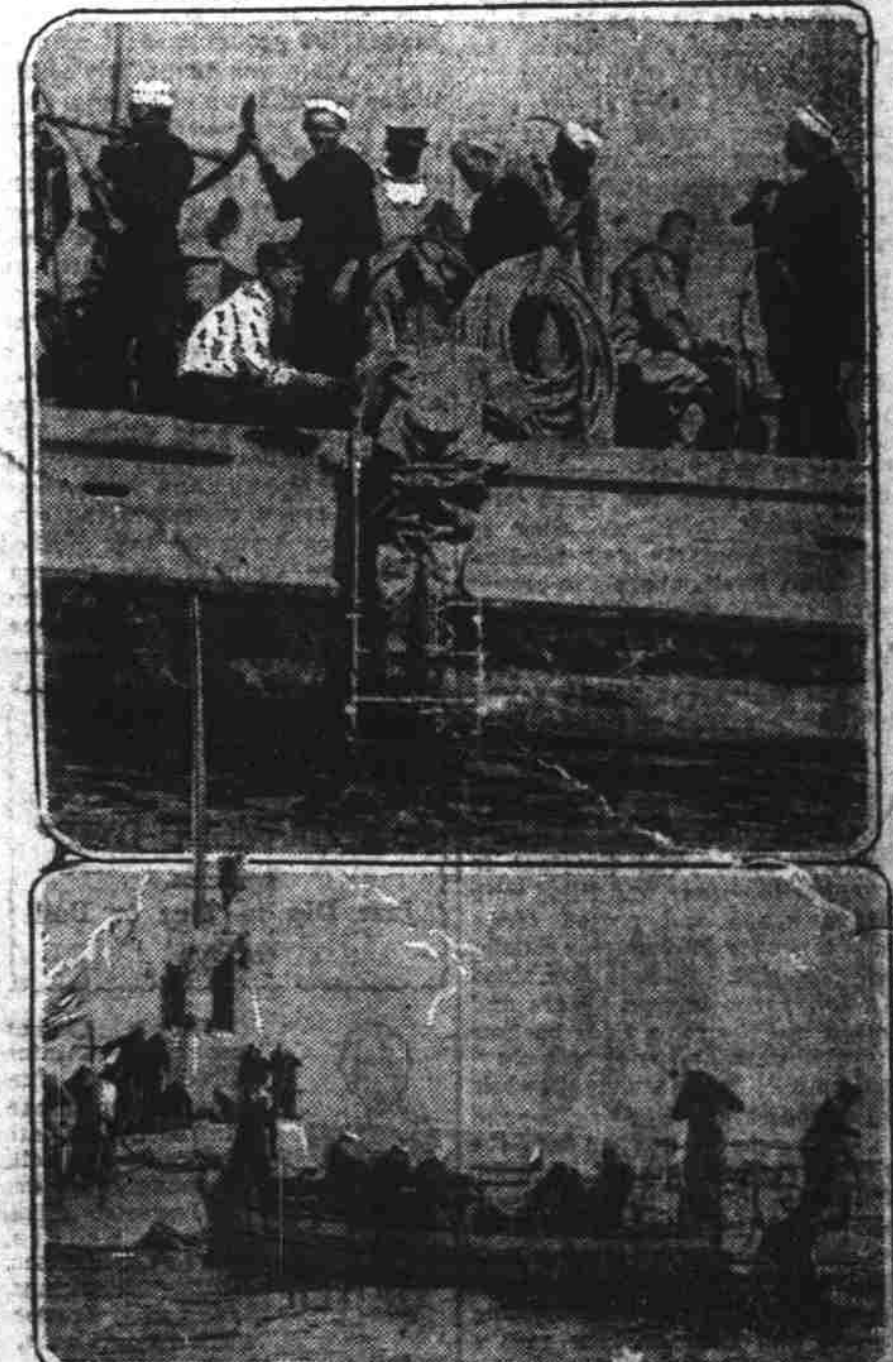
