

SEATTLE BOXER WORKS OUT AT ARMORY TONIGHT FOR WEDNESDAY CARD

TWENTY-FOUR FAST ROUNDS ARE SLATED

Fighters Post Bond to Guarantee Action According to Matchmaker Plant

Joe Jewett, of Seattle will arrive in Salem this afternoon and work out at the Armory tonight in preparation for his meeting with Ernie Woodard of Portland. In the main event, a ten 3-minute bout, at the Armory Wednesday night, Woodard will arrive the afternoon of the battle, according to Harry Plant, matchmaker.

In the semi-finals Shadow Grez will meet Russell Green, in six 3-minute rounds. Both live in Salem and are well known to local fight fans. Sailor Manning of Salem and George Hennings of Vancouver are slated for four fast 3-minute rounds while Jimmy Fargo of Salem and Eddie Fox, Independence, will perform for a similar bout. One snappy preliminary will close the card.

Matchmaker Plant is inaugurating a new method this season in an effort to guarantee fight fans the full money's worth. A double ticket will be issued and if the participants in the evening's entertainment fail to deliver the goods, the boxing commission will stop the fight, see that the fighters do not collect for their appearance and fans will be able to use the other half of their ticket for the next card.

All fighters are under bond to fight and know that if they do not deliver the goods this will be forfeited and they will be barred from further appearance in the city.

ALIBI FOR CHECK FAILS

WILLIAM SLOCUM SENT TO JAIL UNTIL TRIAL

Arrested on a charge of larceny, William Slocum was arraigned in the justice court yesterday, had his case continued and was lodged in the county jail after failing to provide a bond of \$500.

dry goes. And yet, he declared, "we are generous in giving to things that don't count, and are stingy in giving to the church. As for the Christian life, he declared, that even if he were convinced that there was to be no future, he would continue to be a Christian for the good Christianity does on this earth. But Billy Sunday does believe most emphatically in a heaven. He said:

"I would rather have standing room in heaven than a drawing room in hell! You cannot afford to be in doubt about where you will spend eternity, for it will be either in heaven or hell."

There are three ways, he said, in which God reveals himself on this earth; by creation, by His providences, and by the magnification of His word. His word, the Bible, "is the only book that tells about heaven. The Bible was written that you might believe in Christ, not to give you lessons in history."

"God can not only save you from the guilt of sin, but he can also protect you against the power of sin," declared the evangelist. "Knowledge will be perfect when you get to heaven. There are lots of things I want to ask the Lord when I am in heaven; and He will explain." In discriminating between the use of the words lie and falsehood, he said:

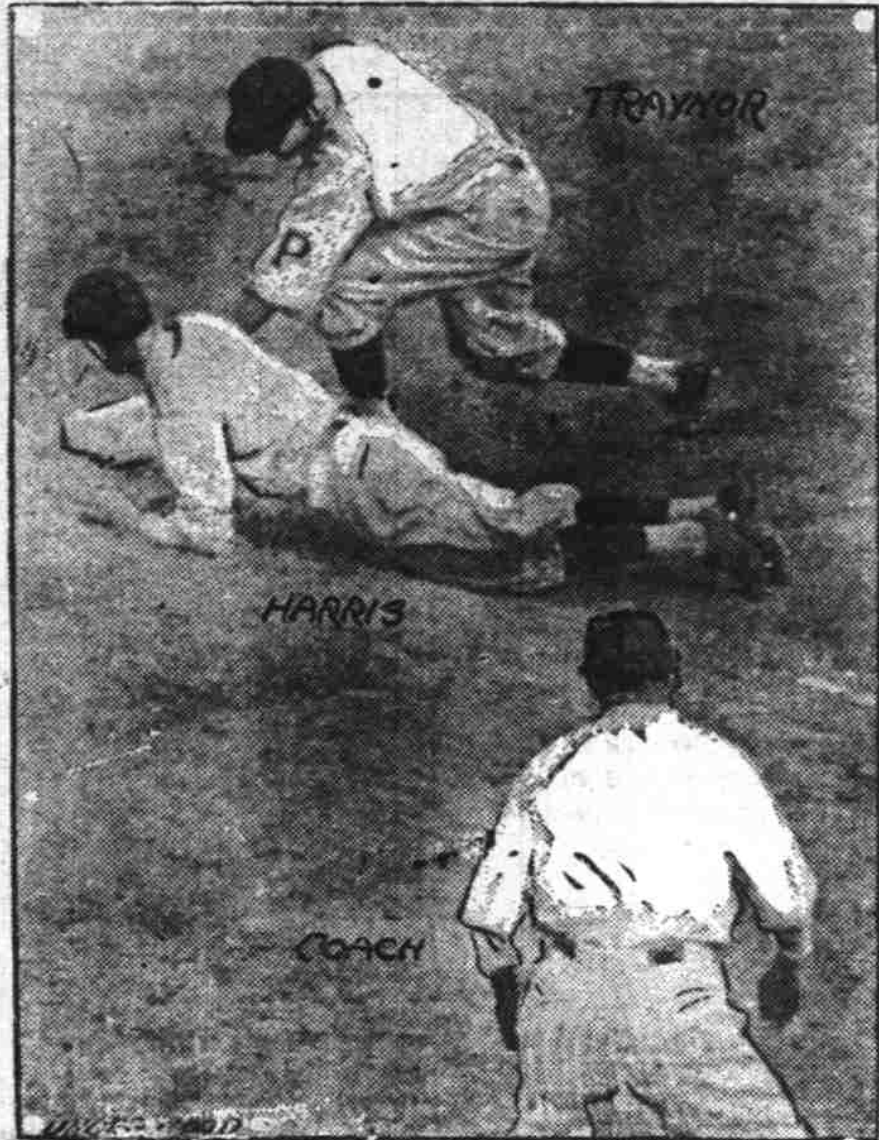
"A lie is wittingly told with malice aforethought with an eye to getting an advantage not to be obtained by truth. A falsehood is told to a person who has no business to know anything about the truth anyway." Mr. Sunday has no patience for men who impose upon women to marry them to reform them. He said:

"Girls, if a man wants you to marry him to reform him, inform him that you are not running a whiskey cure establishment! Make him reform before you marry him!"

Mr. Sunday advocates hope as a great influence in the lives of every one. He declared:

"It is hope that puts you on the operating table, and keeps you from trembling in contemplation of the graveyard. A suicide hopes that his act will remove him from the troubles of this earth. Although I believe that no man over

committed suicide who was not abnormal. It is only hope that can cheer us, we can't be cheered by riches, honor or fame." Nor has Mr. Sunday any use for infidels.

"If I were God for 15 minutes," he declared, "I'd slam some of these old infidels so hard that there would be nothing left of them for the devil but their whiskers and their vests!"

"No people under God's heaven are better fed or paid than in America," Mr. Sunday said, and as a result, it should be America who will be foremost in boosting for God.

Mr. Sunday is not for every body in the Bible apparently, however, for he dubbed Solomon to be a "33rd degree sport. How he ever got 'I don't know.'" Speaking again of prohibition, he declared:

"It is no longer a question of being wet or dry, but of having respect or disrespect for the law." Governor Walter M. Pierce presided at the meeting, and introduced Billy Sunday as "the greatest pulpit orator in the world. He has done more than any one else to uphold the Christian religion in our age."

"Ma" Sunday, wife of the evangelist, spoke a few words in connection with the taking of the collection. She said they did not want the money for themselves, but that they are helping to keep the Bible institute at Winona, Indiana, going, and that they are putting their money in that enterprise. She said that within the last five years, they have given something like \$80,000 to the institution.

PLANS FOR TAX CUT OFFERED BY MELLON

point Under-secretary Winston speaking for Mr. Mellon declared that since this reduction had been given to the taxpayer it would be mighty difficult to take it away from them.

Amplifying this statement later he said that if congress should decide to repeal the provision, the lowest normal income could be reduced from two to one per cent instead of to one and one half per cent.

Mr. Mellon went squarely on record as opposing repeal of some of the so-called nuisance taxes, as had been suggested both in and out of congress. Among these were the amusement and passenger automobile taxes.

Pointing out that the amusement tax applies only to admissions costing in excess of fifty cents, the treasury secretary said this tax did not seem too particularly burdensome and that it ought to be retained in the interest of the \$32,000,000 revenue which it produces.

The sales tax on passenger automobiles is estimated to produce \$90,000,000 annually and Mr. Mellon told the committee that as long as the federal government contributed more than \$90,000,000 a year to good roads "on which these automobiles run, they certainly ought to be made to pay their way."

The dominant feature in the long prepared statement which the treasury secretary read was the argument for reduction of the surtaxes. He held the necessity for such a reduction paramount, and declared it would serve to remove some of the existing inequalities in the administration of the revenue law.

"It has been the experience of the treasury," he said, "that every time there has been a material reduction in surtaxes, it has stimulated business and brought about an increase in taxable income which has made up a great part, if not all, of the loss of revenue from the higher incomes."

A reduction of the lower brackets in itself means no increase in taxable income. A man with a \$5,000 salary does not carry funds in non-productive investments and a reduction of his taxes does not therefore create additional taxable income.

FARM REMINDERS FROM THE COLLEGE

Support for Overloaded Fruit Tree Branches; More Cheap Forage Is Needed

(Following are paragraphs from a current bulletin of the department of industrial journalism of the Oregon Agricultural college.)

Artificial support for branches overloaded with fruit becomes pressing just before the crop comes up, with the starches largely turning to sugar as the fruit matures. Most Oregon trees that have been rightly pruned from the start get along all right without tying or bracing, as it is considered by growers and experiment station specialists a good practice now to allow the upright limbs to bend down with their fruit and thus spread the tree. Masts of 2-inch square pieces, one end on the ground, a few feet higher than the tree with ropes tied to the branches needing support, are used and

All senior and junior members not present last night are urged to attend the next meeting, Thursday, October 29, at 7:30 o'clock recommended by the experiment station, though rather expensive in some districts.

In hill selecting next year's potato seed, hills and show green and look vigorous later than the average are recommended by the experiment station for improvement in the Oregon potato crop. The leaves should be normal for the variety with no unusual wrinkling or mottling—indications of mosaic. Mosaic leaves have small areas less green and more yellow than the healthy leaf. Sometimes these leaves appear to have thin spots in them. Plants with uniform, green smooth leaves are the best. They may be staked now and dug later or dug now and put into crates for storage on cooling out. Seed selection pays in the commercial field and is particularly valuable for next year seed plot.
