Successful Recital Given
The many Salem friends of Professor Franklin B. Launer, now of the Christian College Conservatory of Music at Columbia, Missouri, will be interested to know of the large success which is greeting him in his new location.

Under the caption, "Sunday Recital at Christian College," the Columbia Daily Tribune has this to say:

"The piano recital at Christian College yesterday afternoon by Franklin B. Launer, new assistant director of the Conservatory of Music, was the program of an artist from start to finish.

"Rarely has a Columbia audience heard a performer who showed a higher conception of composer's moods and greater accuracy in execution.

"The Chopin group was so finely done that the trained listener often caught glimpses of De Pachenmann. Mr. Launer's unusually delicate touch gave at times a flawless melody and again flashes of tone that proved him to be master of contrasts in handling his instrument.

"The difficult Debussy number, Reflets dans l'eau, showed accuracy and keen insight into the interpretation of the modern school. The Philipp number, Fireflies, which was dashed off with delightful abandon was studied with that great master, while Mr. Launer was a student in Paris.

"Mr. Launer was forced to respond to an encore after the Spoon River number so sympathetic was his interpretation of the pioneer spirit as revealed in the folk dance.

"The singing melody of the Mendelssohn-Liszt transcription on Wings of Song was beautifully apparent and the Hungarian Rhapsody which closed the program was a masterpiece of brilliancy or rare ability.


