SILVERTON, Ore., Oct. 20.—(Special).—Delbert Reeves Post of the American Legion is making big plans for the dedication of the new armory which is nearing completion at Silvertown and which was secured through the untiring efforts of the local Legion post. ## SALEM CANNERYMAN RETURNS FROM TRIP

Will G. Allen, of Hunt Brothers, Visits Head Offices in California

Will G. Allen, manager of Hunt brothers' cannery, has returned from a trip to California, during which he visited the head offices of the cannery. According to him, the prospects are good for cannerymen in the northwest. He said that "some lessons are to be learned" by the cannerymen of this section, as a result of the year's experiences.

That the cannery business is enlarging is evidenced by the report that Mr. Allen brings back

from the south. He said that 9,000,000 cases of peaches were canned this year in California, or about twice as many as have been packed in any previous season. He said that the entire output was "cleaned up" as the demand was enormous.

Mr. Allen believes that if the right price is taken, the consumers will buy all the goods that the cannerymen have to offer. He cited as proof of this the fact that Englishmen have been buying large quantities of loganberries since they have been given the right price.

He predicted that there will be a large development of the berry industry if prices are not too stiff. In his opinion the cannerymen will begin to reap the greatest benefits of their efforts when "reliable fruit men put their pack into the hands of reliable cannerymen year after year with a fair price which will bring some returns all around." Volume of business appears to Mr. Allen as a better way of making returns than from exorbitant prices.

## DEBATE PROSPECTS ARE HELD BRIGHT

Two Veterans Return to Willamette Campus; Tryouts Are Next Month

The debate prospects at Willamette university are exceedingly bright, according to Prof. Horace Rahskopf, head of the public speaking department at the university and coach of the debate squad. Charles Redding and Joel Berreman, the men that represented Willamette on a debate tour last year, are both back in school and have signified their intentions of turning out for the team. James McClintock, who was also a member of the debate team last year, is back in school and will be out for his old berth. In addition to these William McAllister, a member of the freshmen debate team last year, is looked upon as a candidate for a position on the team. Most of this year's debating by Willamette will be done on the home floor. Redland university of Redland, Cal., will journey to Salem for the purpose of meeting the Willamette team. This will be the fourth annual tilt between the two schools. Willamette has won two of the three debates already held with them.

The College of the Pacific of Stockton, Cal., will also come to Salem for the third annual match with Willamette. Both of the previous contests were won by Willamette. Wheaton college of Wheaton, Illinois, is planning to make a debate tour through the west, and have expressed a desire to meet the Willamette team. Prof. Rahskopf is quite sure that the debate will be held. There is also a prospect of a debate in Salem with Whitman university.

A dual debate will be held with College of Puget Sound. One side of the debate will be upheld on the home floor, and the other side of the debate will be held in Tacoma, site of that school.

Robert Wittly, a sophomore at Willamette, has been appointed manager of the debate team. Heretofore it has been up to the chairman of the Willamette forensics council to manage the debates, but in as much as the chairman is usually an active member of the debate team, the executive committee of the student body did not consider it fair for him to have so many responsibilities. Mr. Wittly has written to Oregon university and OAC in an endeavor to arrange debates with those schools. Definite agreement has not yet been reached with either school, but it is the hope of the Willamette aggregation to meet

them both. There is also a prospect of a debate tournament to be held at Pullman under the auspices of the Pacific Forensic league. The league will meet there in the spring for its annual meeting, and it is certain that an extemporaneous speaking contest will be held at that time. It is the hope of several schools members of the league that a debate tournament will be held at the same time. Prof. Rahskopf states that the

try outs for the debate team will be held in the latter part of November, and training will start immediately after that. The debate season will commence sometime in February, and will last through the first part of April.
