RECORD DROUGHT OVER

ILWACO, Wash., Oct. 24.—(By Associated Press.)—Following a very heavy fog during yesterday evening and last night a fine rain this morning broke the long dry spell which old residents here claim is the driest summer and fall in 40 years. 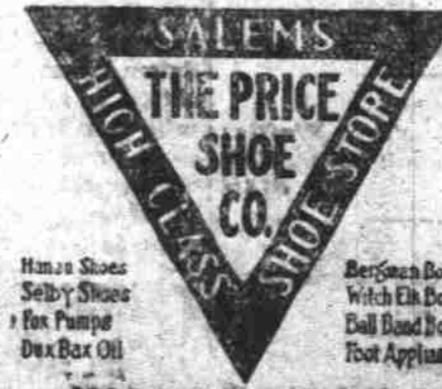
