In 1892 Miss West canvassed the state of Michigan, driving a horse and buggy and without other help organized the Order of Maccabees—fraternally known as the Woman's Benefit association—now standing fourth in

rank among the 88 fraternal societies which make up the National Fraternal Insurance congress of which Miss West is the first woman president.
