**Nature of the Holy Spirit**  
Sermon delivered at the Court  
Street Christian church last Sun-

Text from John 16:13.

One is treading on holy ground  
when discussing the Holy Spirit.  
There is much confusion in the  
Christian world regarding the na-  
ture of this Comforter Christ  
promises His disciples after His

trusting their emotion, personal  
experience or what others say,  
rather than taking their informa-  
tion from the true source.

As in all things divine the Bible  
is the only source of information  
concerning the Holy Spirit. In  
the Old Testament there are 88  
distinct references and in the New  
Testament 264 references to the  
Holy Spirit. A careful study of  
all these passages will reveal all  
there is to know this side of  
heaven concerning this subject.

Jesus in words of our text and  
context refers to Him as a per-  
sonality. "He" and "him" are  
pronouns used by the Savior in  
speaking of the comforter He pro-  
mised. "No matter what men may  
claim," "an influence emanating  
from God," or "a mere imperson-
