It was split up into eleven parts. The largest piece was cut and set in the scepter of King George of England. Many other diamonds of renown are in existence. Most valuable ones are pure crystal clear as water, but when foreign elements enter into them they are white, yellow, green and brown, and in rare instances even orange, red, blue and black.

But all these diamonds if gathered into one treasure could not account for the price of eternal life. No measure of earthly treasure can balance the gift of God's love. MILITARY BAND IS COMING WEDNESDAY

Through the efforts of General George A. White, adjutant general for Oregon, one of the largest and best-trained military bands in the northwest will be in Salem Armistice Day, according to Biddy Bishop, general chairman, who has charge of the American Legion celebration this year. The musical organization is the 186th infantry band of 50 pieces from Portland. The band will play at various times during the day, participate in the parade and then leave for Silverton about 6 o'clock where it will take part in the celebration.

Sale of the American Legion tickets is progressing in a satisfactory manner and already more than \$1000 has been turned in. Bishop announced last night. Expenses for the celebration are heavy this year and will amount to around \$500. Capital Post No. 9, in charge of the day's activities, is making an effort to clear \$2500 in order to clear up payments on the drum and bugle corps and to finance the post activities during the year. If the celebration proves the success indicated, it will be made an annual event and the American Legion will center on Armistice Day as a day for financing the organization in the future.

The purchaser of a ticket is assured his money's worth, for it will be accepted at one of two football games, any one of the three theaters cooperating with the American Legion, and at either of two big dances at night. Managements of the various attractions will receive 50 per cent of the proceeds from the ticket sales. Those planning to attend the football game or show are urged by Chairman Bishop to purchase the Legion tickets, as the Legion does not receive anything from box office receipts.

BUDGET IS CALLED "SCRAP OF PAPER"

Just how the budget just passed upon would be affected by a special election to raise the teachers' salaries. He was also asked to get together with the teachers committee and draw up a salary schedule, with a detailed list of the salary each teacher in Salem schools is now getting, and what he or she would get under the new schedule. It is thought that the schedule that would prove satisfactory to the teachers would mean asking for from \$30,000 to \$50,000 or a tax levy of approximately three mills.

At the meeting of the school board the members voted to accept the report of the budget committee, and agreed that the budget as worked out shall stand for the ensuing year. Practically every department of the school system is affected in pruning the budget to eliminate the \$9,600 which, because of the 6 per cent limitation, could only be obtained by special election.

The material and supplies items were cut from \$22,600 to \$19,650. This meant slashing of the funds for educational equipment and supplies, library books, printing, praxage and freight.

The amount allotted for maintenance and repairs was cut from \$7,800 to \$3,850, repairs on practically every school building

in the city being involved. The fund laid aside for grading the athletic school in back of the Parry junior high school, amounting to \$200, was eliminated, the insurance was cut from \$1500 to \$1000, miscellaneous from \$1500

to \$500; emergency fund of \$1080 was eliminated and the amount allowed for interest on warrants was chopped from \$100 to \$50. While these drastic cuts pruned the budget to fit the receipts, it meant the curtailing of many

items vitally essential to the efficiency of the Salem school system. But the board feared that the taxpayers would refuse to vote a special levy in which case they would be left without any budget at all.
