**LITTLE OPPOSITION OFFERED TAX BILLS**

would ask for record votes. Senator Norris also asked that greater cuts be made on the smaller income rates and less reduction of the surtax schedules.

A unanimous report by the house ways and means committee does not appear likely at the present time, but a majority of democrats and republicans are believed certain to follow the endorsement of the measure so far given by their party leaders on the committee.

In starting revision Monday of the excise rates, the committee will consider all of the schedules as a unit, deciding first on the apportionment among the various levies it will allow for reduction. Among the rates which the committee has been asked to repeal in this class are those in automobiles, trucks, tires and accessories, admissions, duo, jewelry and virtually every other tax now existing on special forms of business.

Repeal of all of these would cut government revenues by almost \$400,000,000 annually, whereas only \$100,000,000 of the treasury estimated surplus remains avail-

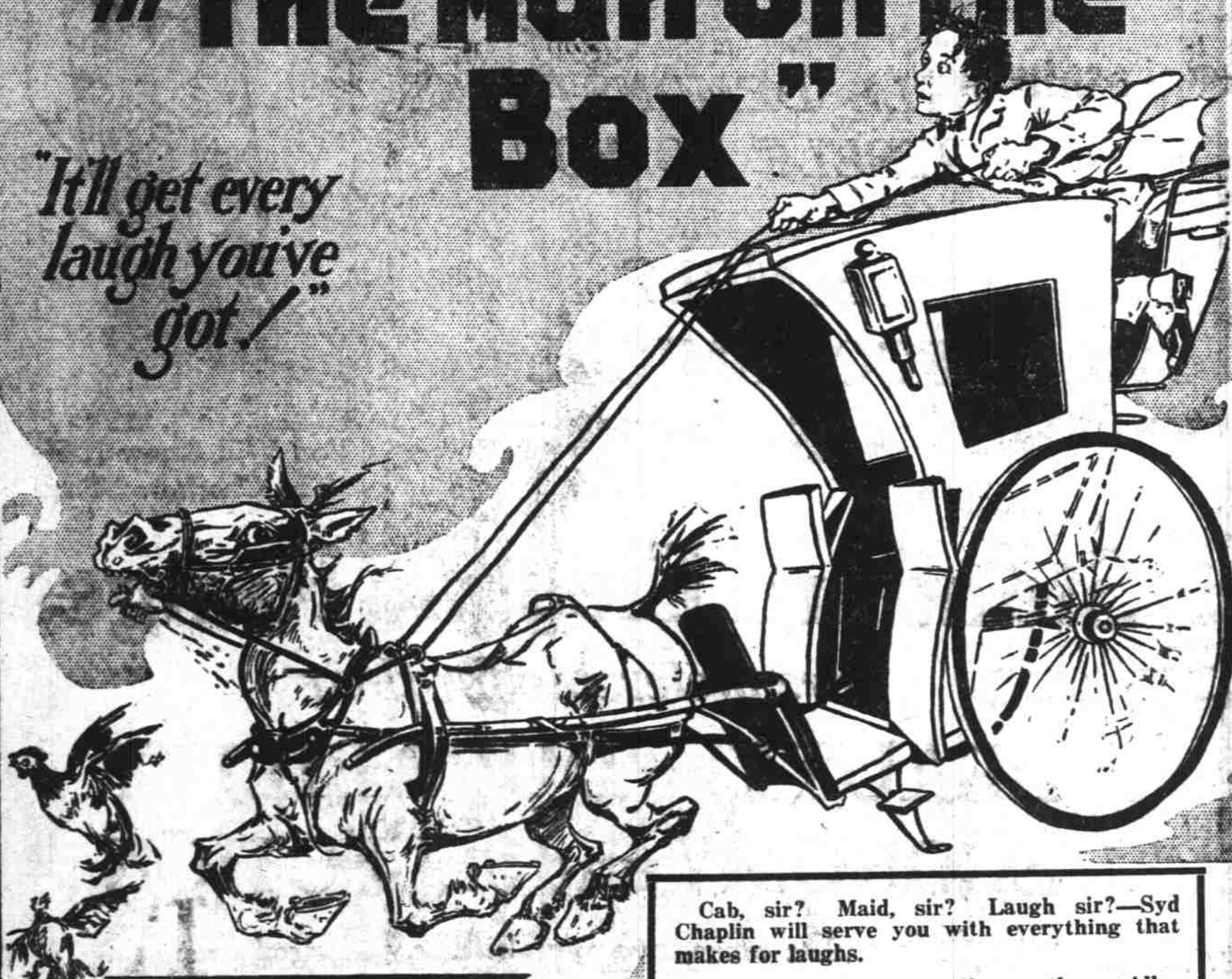
