LET SALEM HELP TO TELL IT WITH ROSES

Thanksgiving Rose Show at Portland Unique and Well Worthy of Help

(The Portland Journal of November 8, had the following editorial article, under the heading, "Tell It With Roses:")

"W. C. Culbertson has been named by the Progressive Business Men's club as manager of the Thanksgiving Rose Show to be given November 23 under the auspices of that organization.

"Mr. Culbertson was manager of last year's highly successful Thanksgiving show. He entered upon his duties then, as he will now, with the utmost enthusiasm and with a complete understanding of the possibilities of the event. He deserves the cooperation of every Portlander, and, because of his own enthusiasm, will probably receive it.

"It goes without saying that a successful rose show can be held in Oregon in June. The world expects that. But the world doesn't know that the queen of flowers is as much at home in Portland in November as in June. To demonstrate that fact to all comers is what Mr. Culbertson, the Progressive Business Men and all who cooperate with them have set out to do.

"Only the rose fanciers have observed that the heat of midsummer quickly tends to wither the flowers and that the tang of autumn and winter gives a better color to the stock. Numerous exhibitors who have entered displays in all the Portland June shows declared that the exhibits at last year's [Thanksgiving show were superior to any in the usual June festivals.

"Why not let the world be told that there is more than one month in which the rose grows in Portland?

"What better way to do it than for Portland to present a Thanksgiving Rose Show, as she can, that will be a revelation to all on-lookers?"

Good Idea; Let's Help

That is a splendid idea. Salem should help promote it. Salem is more of a rose city, in proportion to her population, than Portland. We have many rose enthusiasts here; people who know roses thoroughly and make them grow to perfection.

ABANY, Roseburg, Marshfield and other cities and towns sent roses to Portland last year, for their Thanksgiving rose show.

Salem people who have roses should send them to W. C. Culbertson, care Multnomah hotel. That is where the show will be held. Mr. Culbertson is proprietor of the Seward hotel, Portland, and of the New Salem hotel here. Mr. and Mrs. Culbertson make their home in Salem part of the time, at the Roberts apartments.

Entries for the Thanksgiving rose show can be made till next Tuesday.
