

SALEM SPORTSMEN URGING TROUT FRY

100,000 Wanted for Planting in Mill Creek; Turkey Shoot Is Sunday

In a letter which is to be forwarded to the state game commission today, the Salem Rod and Gun club has requested that 100,000 mountain trout be planted in Mill creek and that the stream be closed for fishing for at least one year and possibly for two years. It will also be requested that several thousand Chinese pheasants be liberated in Marion and Polk counties.

This matter of distribution and preservation of game in this locality was taken up at the meeting of the gun club last night in the Chamber of Commerce rooms. Dr. G. E. Prime, president of the club, has received several letters from the state game commission asking for cooperation in game matters and promising the attention and cooperation of the commission in any move the Salem club would take in the interest of preservation of game. It is believed by Dr. Prime and members of the club that the state commission will act favorably on the letters recommending the planting of fish and the liberation of game birds.

The gun club also favors the plan of closing many of the small streams in this district for a period of one year, and recommended in particular that the Little North Fork of the Santiam be closed for that length of time. "The reason for such a move is generally known to fishermen," Dr. Prime said. "After the first day or two of open season the fish taken from the stream are of very small size."

The club recommended that the pheasants be liberated during April of next year and that the fish be planted as soon after the first of the year as possible. Plans for a large turkey shoot were completed at the Tuesday night meeting. It is to be held on Sunday, November 22. The shoot will be divided into three classes to enable all members of the organization to be on an equal footing. The first class will consist of expert shots, the second of those who have done some trapshooting, and the third to be composed of men who have had little or no experience. The shoot will be arranged so that the third class will get a chance at as many birds as the first class. The shoot will be held at Twenty-fifth and Turner road.

COMMUNISTS TRY TO SPREAD PROPAGANDA

Third Internationale Affiliation Aiming at Public School Students

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 17.—(By Associated Press.)—Communist schools, teaching theory of communism and Leninism, are being organized in a number of cities in the United States, communist leaders here declared tonight. C. A. Hathaway, northwestern organizer of the Workers' party, established the school here under direction of the central executive committee in Chicago. The school opens tomorrow to run for twenty weeks. "Young workers," the junior communists are being supplied with literature for distribution in the city schools aimed to offset American educational week in the public schools.

"We want education for action, not abstract education," declared Mr. Hathaway tonight. "We are teaching our young people that the constitution of the United States is the bulwark of class rule and that the workers must promote the needed change." In New York and Chicago, he said, schools are in operation to teach the instructors for the communist schools in various parts of the country. The movement is affiliated with the Third International of Moscow, he said. Courses consist of English to aid foreign workers especially; the communist theory, public speaking, trade unionism, advanced economics and Leninism.

Mr. Hathaway said he does not expect any interference with their plans to distribute communist literature to the public school students as this has been done before without trouble. "The central executive committee," he said, "considers national education week, when the schools and churches are emphasizing the need for capitalistic education, as a good time to show our young people that this education is not for the workers." A special publication, "The Young Worker," is being issued from Chicago headquarters in con-

PEACE PACT IS SIGNED

CHINESE GENERALS AGREE TO JOINT PROTECTION

SHANGHAI, Nov. 17.—(By Associated Press.)—The Eastern News agency learns from Peking that representative of Feng Yufsiang, the Christian general, and Marshal Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian war lord, have signed a peace agreement under which no Manchurian troops are to be stationed at Tientsin, but all are to retire thirty miles east of the Peking-Hankow line. It is also agreed to establish a joint office at Peking to discuss the questions of the premiership, the reconstruction of the cabinet and the election of a president.

STEINBOCK WANTS TO HIRE MORE HELP

He Has Twenty-two People Now on His Industrial Payroll, Making Tires

Most readers of The Statesman saw the news item in yesterday's paper in the report of the proceedings of the Salem city council on Monday evening, concerning the proposition of H. Steinbock to erect a new corrugated iron building to cover most of the half block fronting on Marion, Center and Commercial streets.

For Large Factory Mr. Steinbock is offered a lease of this property by the Southern Pacific company, which owns it. Mr. Steinbock wants to lease the property and put up the buildings to house his tire factory and wholesaling department, and his retail department for tires and automobile accessories.

He is now making tires, called the "Oregon Special," under the name of the Special Tire Manufacturing company, in his junk establishment at the corner of Front and Center streets, and he is already employing 22 people in this new industry.

Go Long Distances These tires are shipped long distances, to the trade. They go to most Oregon towns and cities—and the shipments amount already to five to six dozens a day.

They are buying new rubber in five ton lots. They are planning now to put this manufacturing on a twenty-four hour basis, because they are crowded for room, and the business is growing fast.

Mr. Steinbock wants to put up the new building in order to be able to expand this branch of his business, and to have better show rooms and store rooms. He must expand, some where. He will employ 40 to 50 people in his new location, and he expects to see this grow to 100 people, and perhaps a great many more.

A part of the site Mr. Steinbock wants to build on is within the fire limits. That is the reason he wants a permit from the city council to build with corrugated iron. Certainly, the structure he proposes to build will be much more of an ornament to that part of the city than are the buildings it would displace.

To say nothing of providing a new and permanent and increasing industrial payroll to the activities of this city.
