

STUDENTS LINE UP SPECIAL SERVICE

Southern Pacific to Run Train to Corvallis Saturday; Leaves at Noon

A sufficient number of tickets have been sold to Salem high school students to insure a special train to Corvallis and return for the big game against Corvallis high school Saturday, according to announcement made last night by the local officials of the Southern Pacific company. Word received from the high school reveals that well over 100 tickets have been sold, and it is expected the 200 mark will be reached before tonight.

The train will leave Saturday noon from the corner of Trade and High. The students are assured by the company that the train will arrive in plenty of time for the game, and will be run right up alongside the field on which the contest is to be played. The special round trip fare on the train is \$1.10.

Corvallis' viewpoint of Salem's attitude, as expressed by the Gazette-Times of that city, is "Salem comes to Corvallis confident of victory and believing that J. Drager, elongated S. H. S. tackle, will out punt Henry Dungan. Drager is playing his fourth year of football for the Senators and is heralded by fans from the Capital city as a terror on both the offense and defense. It is expected that the first period of the game Saturday will be a punting duel between Drager and Dungan."

Dungan, star player for the Corvallis team, is in danger of not playing Saturday, it was rumored in Salem Thursday. It is said that he is 25 years old, while the age limit for high school teams is said to be 20. It is understood that the matter is now being threshed out.

Salem is hoped to win the game, having beaten Eugene 18-6 and Albany 3-0 while Corvallis beat the former 6-0 and tied the latter, 0-0. But for the last four years Salem has failed to defeat the Corvallis team, the scores being 6-0, 0-3, 0-32, and 7-9, and it is feared that the confidence inspired by past scores may be a big factor in influencing Corvallis to play an unusually strong game.

Hollis Huntington, Salem high mentor, announces that the line-up for Saturday's game will be as follows: Backfield, Lang or A. Lyons, full; Kelly and Noeske, halves; and B. Drager, quarter. The line will be made up of H. Lyons, center; Davis and Jackson, guards; J. Drager and Blaco, tackles; and Temple and Adams, ends.

Eckert, who has been playing regularly at end, wrenched his ankle in the game with Hillsboro and will be out for the remainder of the season. The team underwent a light workout last night, keeping to signal practice, and not undergoing scrimmages. Coach Huntington declares the team is in excellent condition.

Coach Huntington announced Thursday that a game has been arranged with Franklin high school, to be played on Sweetland field Thanksgiving day. He endeavored to arrange with Jefferson high school, but its team has finished its games in Portland, and it is said the team has disbanded for the season.

In answer to the tribute, Stoishelge, acting on behalf of the team, made the girls a brief address, declaring that in the four years he has been on the Willamette foot ball team there had never before been shown such interest in the team by the co-eds of the school.

The showing followed on the heels of a two hours' practice in breaking up forward passes and making good attempted passes.

"For the past two years," Coach Rathbun declared, "Pacific university has beaten us by the use of a double pass. We are hoping that our boys will be able to check them in such endeavor Saturday."

THREE MEN CONVICTED DEFENDANTS IN LIQUOR CASE FOUND GUILTY BY JURY

John Andrews, Henry Johnson and Lester Dixon were convicted in the circuit court here yesterday on a charge of possession of the huge Mount Angel still seized by county, state and federal men on April 28 of this year. The jury debated for seven hours and a half before agreeing on a verdict.

In a previous trial the jury disagreed on the case and a mistrial was ordered by Judge Percy R. Kelly. Joe Walker, on whose farm the still was found, was convicted, however, and sentenced by Judge Kelly to serve one year in jail and to pay a fine of \$3000. His case has been appealed to the supreme court.

Johnson, Andrews and Dixon were defended by Attorneys Gaters and Critchlow of Portland. John Carson, district attorney, and Lyle J. Page, deputy, handled the

case for the state. Circuit Judge L. H. McMahan presided.

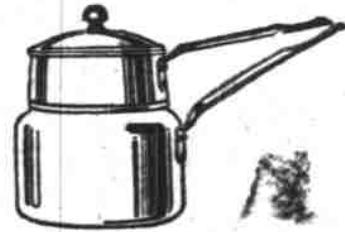
