

### REALTORS OPPOSE PLAYGROUND SLASH

Organization Backs Up Action Taken by Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs

The Marion-Polk County Realtors association at their weekly luncheon Thursday went on record as being opposed to the elimination of the playground fund in the budget for the coming year. By their vote they agreed to collaborate with the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs of this city in an endeavor to induce the council at the taxpayers meeting December 8 to reconsider the matter of the playground fund, which was eliminated from the budget this year by the budget committee. The matter will also be brought before the Lions club at its meeting this noon.

Mrs. Winifred Pettyjohn was the first to speak in favor of the playgrounds, declaring that any thing for the children of the city should not be eliminated, especially when the cost is but \$800.

W. H. Grabenhorst declared himself as being in favor of the playgrounds, saying that if anything "the amount allowed should be doubled."

"I want to go on record for the

playgrounds of the city," asserted Mr. W. H. Pennington. "If they are not a success now, let's make the money enough so that they will be."

Will Moore, state real estate commissioner, who was the speaker at the luncheon, declared:

"I want to add my testimony to the playgrounds. Eight hundred and fifty dollars is a small sum to spend on the children. Better have them in the playgrounds than running around undirected. Now that the auto and such inventions have come, the children do not get as much supervision at home as they once did."

### CULBERTSON IS HONORED

CANBY MAN NAMED ROSARIAN "PRIME MINISTER"

The Portland Rosarians yesterday elected W. C. Culbertson as "prime minister" of their organization.

Mr. Culbertson is a live-wire business man of the metropolis, and has a multiplicity of interests elsewhere in the state. In addition to being proprietor of the Seward hotel of Portland and the New Salem of this city, he is owner and manager of a fine 200-acre farm in Clackamas county. He also owns and edits the Canby Herald, a thriving newspaper published in Canby, Or.

### SALEM PROSPEROUS WILL MOORE SAYS

Real Estate Commissioner Urges Good Road to Silver Creek Falls

"There is at present more prosperity in Salem than any where else in the state," was the assertion made by Will Moore, state real estate commissioner, in addressing the Marion-Polk county realtors at their weekly luncheon Thursday.

"A good road from Salem to Silver Creek Falls would be a money maker for the city. Such scenic beauty in California would be made to net a large income annually through attracting tourist patronage."

He spoke on the new real estate law that is to go into effect the first of the year, revealing that the law was introduced by Fred German, representative of Multnomah county, at the last legislature, and that the bill was instigated by the Portland realty board.

"When the law is in effect," he said, those selling standing timber must be licensed. "Some of the provisions of the new law are that each realtor must give \$1000 bond; the broker must pay \$7.50 for his license and the salesman \$5. The salesman is defined as the man working for the broker. If the broker's license is revoked, or suspended, the license of the salesman working for him is automatically suspended until he shows that he has made connections with another broker.

"This year," Mr. Moore declared, "there were 300 more li-

censes issued than in any year previous, the total now amounting to more than 2800 licenses." Mr. Moore answered several questions put to him by the realtors, telling in answer to one of them that there have been two or three suspensions and revocations of licenses during the past year, the main offense being the retaining of earnest money after the deal has fallen through not due to the fault of the payer of the money.
