When the Prince Regent and the Crown Princess were married, a stork descended into the Palace gardens. A white dove visited the Palace when young Prince Sumi, the fourth Imperial son, was born.

These incidents, with the arrival of the cranes, are looked upon as unusually happy auguries.

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Book of Etiquette and Last Book of Popular Novelist Meet With Approval

Anna Steese Richardson Writes Up-to-the-minute Social Guide; Gene Stratton Porter Closes Career With "The Keeper of the Bees"

Standard Etiquette, by Anna Steese Richardson. Published by Harper and Brothers. Price \$4.00 net.

"Consideration for the rights of others" is the field which true etiquette comprises, and is the interpretation of the term which Anna Steese Richardson has made the solid rock on which to build one of the most reliable and thoroughly accessible books of social usage ever issued. Anna Steese Richardson, in an editorial way, has long been the authoritative friend of thousands. The medium of this friendship—a continual wise counsel concerning all that good taste, good breeding, and good sense implies,—has been assembled into an up-to-date comprehensive guide enhanced by a profusion of illustrative drawings.

Forty-two chapters, arranged according to alphabetical topic, promise ready solution to whatever problem, or question, confronts one, no matter what his age or station. Mrs. Richardson assumes, and assumes it convincingly, that etiquette is not for the "four hundred" alone, but for every individual of the masses as well, in order that the continual shifting social status may never leave him in the lurch.

The concise question-and-answer method is employed throughout and through this service one puzzled may find immediate treatment of his problem.

Mrs. Richardson's book has the advantage of being very current, essentially up-to-the-minute. It is written in a style as piquant as it is pleasing, and deals competently with topic after topic such as the following: Why is Etiquette? Bachelor, Bachelor Girls, Breakfast Giving, Business Etiquette, Dances, Divorce, Gifts, Introductions, (Servants, Musicales, Sunday Entertaining, Washington and Its Official Etiquette, and dozens more.

The Keeper of the Bees, by Gene Stratton-Porter. Published by Doubleday, Page, and company. Price \$2.00 net.

What author, so beloved by the masses as the late Gene Stratton-Porter, ever lived, ever wrote? "The Keeper of the Bees," combining wholesomeness with thrills, rounds out the dozen clamored-for novels of her pen,—a pen that must now lie still.

Mrs. Porter was a disciple of her own precepts. She wrote as she recommended and her recommendations were for the moral best. "To my way of thinking and working," she says, in the supplement on "Her Life and Her Books," which closes her final novel, "the greatest service a piece of fiction can do any reader is to leave him with a higher ideal of life than when he began."

"The Keeper of the Bees" is a marvelous adventure into life by a man whom life had almost defeated. To James Lewis McFarlane a day was neither good nor bad. A noble fellow of Scottish blood he was, but also a soldier of the World War wounded to perpetual exhaustion. When he overheard his doctor making recommendations for his removal to a camp for the tubercular, or near-tubercular, he rebelled, and he rebelled with one splendid vengeance. He left the hospital, penniless, weak, and without word to anyone. The experiences that followed him are packed into the remainder of the book that introduces the reader to a group of characters that are at once vital and beloved.

Gene, the enigmatical small person who chatters and prouettes through the pages with his cronies—Angel Face, Ole Bill, and Nice Child—will remain one of the lasting joys in much passing fiction. The gentle, classic figure of the Bee Master; the great, noble character that was Margaret Cameron; and Molly, a splendid favorite in her Americanization school; as well as the Little Scout, the Bee Master's child partner, make a fortress about Jimmy through which illness and morbidity never again enter. "The Keeper of the Bees" carries with it action enough to excite the most blasé.

The entire book, written in a style as free and easy as it is redolent and virile, affords excellent material for reading aloud.

20-Year Delay in Letter of One Living 10 Miles Away
