

SALEM HI ACCEPTS MEDFORD OFFER FOR FOOTBALL GAME DECEMBER 5

TWENTY MEN WILL MAKE TRIP SOUTH

Red and Black Elven Ready for Turkey Day Game With Franklin Here

Principal J. C. Nelson last night made public the receipt of the following telegram:

"Medford, Oregon: "Will guarantee legitimate expenses for 20 men and \$200 for game here December 5, wire reply."

"When we made the proposition to Medford, we had no idea they would meet our terms," said Mr. Nelson, "and we will most certainly accept. Medford authorities seem to think they can get a crowd of 5,000 persons for the game. Its outcome, in my opinion, will not mean state championship, for Portland schools would not acknowledge the claim. It will be just another good game."

Medford high school has this year one of the best teams of its history. It has defeated all southern Oregon high schools it has met by large scores. It is expected that the game to be played at Medford will be the hardest to bring home that the defenders of the red and the black have yet tackled. Coach Huntington declares, however, that the team will be kept rigidly in shape for the game, and all efforts will be pointed to bring back the victory. The members of the team have expressed themselves as glad of the opportunity to show the people of Medford their wares, and declare they will keep in shape for the contest.

Plans will be developed for either a caravan or a special train to carry Salem rooters to the scene for the contest.

Salem high school's fast football team, the champions of the Willamette valley, will meet Franklin high school of Portland on Sweetland field Thanksgiving day at 2:30 o'clock. The game will be Salem's last for the season to be played in this city.

Franklin high school has showed well this season, tying with three schools, including the championship team of Portland, Jefferson high school. They are especially adept in the art of forward passing.

Coach Huntington announces that there will be no scrimmage before the game, as the men will be given the chance to recuperate from Saturday's strenuous game with Corvallis. Light signal practice will be held each evening. Salem defeated Franklin last year for the state basketball championship.

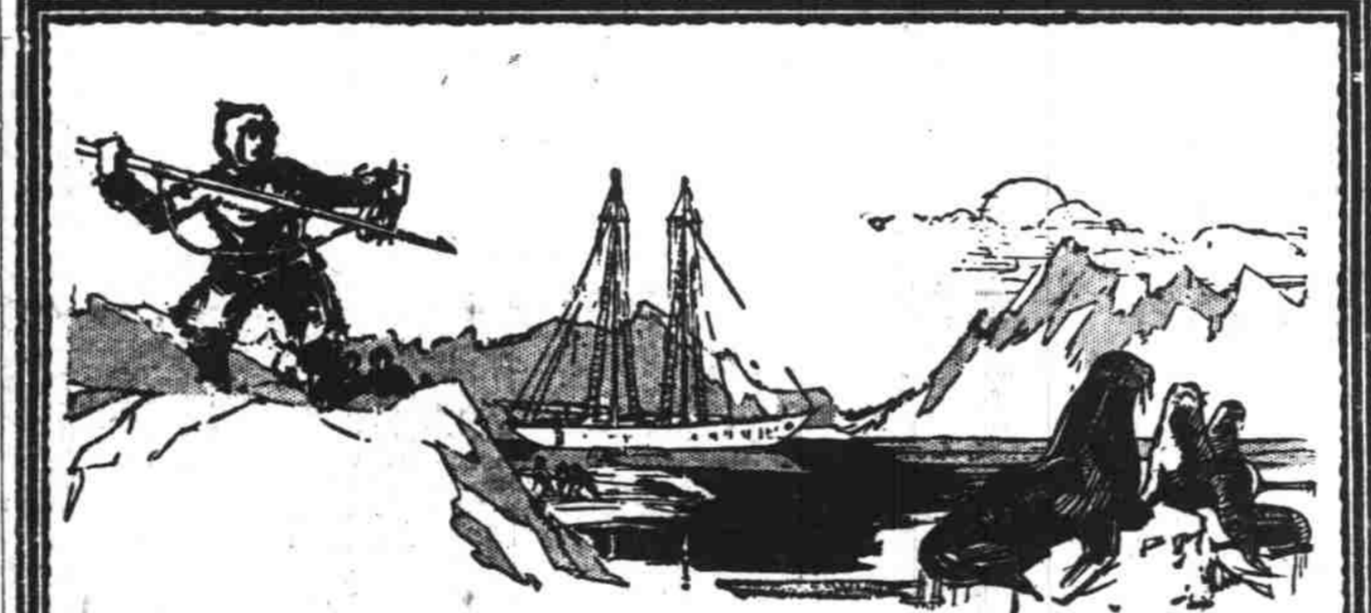
ANGELS BEAT COLUMBIA

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"A Well-Balanced Diet Built Around Meats"

Nothing developed on the trip to cause me to revise my idea about foods; which is that a well-balanced diet built around meats yields the best health results.

On the way north we had fresh domestic meat from the supply taken aboard when we sailed. After we reached the North we relied upon the wild life of the region, using seal, walrus, caribou, muskox, Arctic hare, and many kinds of wild ducks.

Every day we had fresh meat with plenty of fat at at least one meal and usually oftener when supplies were plentiful, and every one came through the four months in excellent condition; in fact, most of the members of the party gained weight.

While we often hear it claimed that eating too much meat is unfavorable to health, it is a fact that such ailments as gout, hardening of the arteries, and other disorders attributed to an excess of meat eating are quite unknown to the Eskimos who eat nothing but meat.

In my own experience I have never known anyone to attempt to live in the Arctic on a vegetarian diet. On the other hand, every Arctic explorer nowadays relies upon the native fresh meats as a sure preventive of scurvy, a much dreaded nutritional disorder which was prevalent in earlier Arctic experience times before we learned a lesson in diet from the Eskimo.

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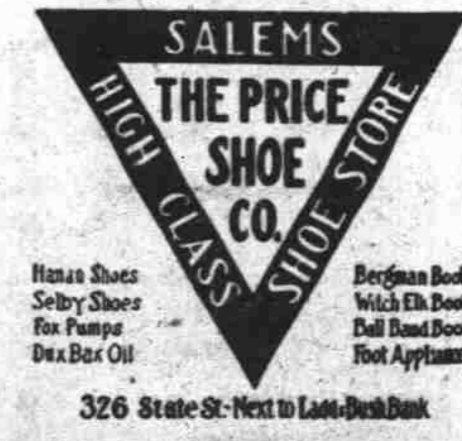
