GERMAN ACE IS BURIED

PRE-WAR MILITARY POMP MARKS FIEBER'S BURIAL

BERLIN, Nov. 23.—(By Associated Press.)—Military pomp such as is accorded only to Germany's most popular military heroes marked the burial today of Baron Manfred Von Richthofen whose body was brought from France several days ago. Von Richthofen, the foremost flying ace of Germany in the world war was shot down and killed back of the British lines along the Somme front early in 1918. He was buried at Fricourt and recently the body was returned to the care of Germany by France.

Brief services were held today in Grace Church where thousands of patriotic Germans had filed past the coffin since Wednesday night. The edifice was crowded with members of the nobility and persons prominent in official and private life. President Von Hindenburg, General Von Seeckt, officers of the staff, the cabinet members and parliamentarians were present.

The simple walnut casket draped with laurel, was carried by eight of the aviator's comrades wearing the decoration of the Order Pour Le Merite resting on the casket was a helmet and sword. When the casket was placed on a caisson, the procession, with a regiment of Reichswehr and a squadron of airplanes overhead, passed through streets lined with infantry and the banners of veterans organizations to the Invaliden cemetery.

Samoan Babies Are Thriving on Milk of Young Coconuts

PAGO PAGO. Young coconuts for young Samoans is the advice of the United States government to South Sea mothers unable to secure milk for their babies.

The use of coconuts for babies is still an experiment, but so far is considered successful. Each child is given the meat of four very young coconuts daily, together with all the coconut milk he can drink.

Child welfare work in Samoa has been organized so that all villages in American Samoa are visited at least once every two weeks. In each village a committee of women has been appointed. Babies are taken to the weekly meetings of this committee. When a baby increases in weight the mother is praised publicly; when it loses, the mother is called to account.

WATER ANALYSIS FOUND NECESSARY

Selection of Site for Linen Plant Awaits Report From Chemist

At the meeting of the board of directors of the new Oregon Linen Mills, Inc., held Monday afternoon at the local chamber of commerce rooms, the members of the board expressed themselves as being well pleased with the financial progress of the enterprise and declared the financial status is so favorable that it is fitting to go ahead immediately with the plans for the new mill.

The treasurer reported that approximately 90 per cent of the money has come in from the first call. As a result, the board felt justified in going ahead, and have wired eastern connections for two experts to come to the coast immediately for the purpose of assisting in locating and laying out the new plant. It is expected they will arrive about the first of next month.

Because of the liability of mineral in the water from supply of any source other than a running stream, choice of a site for the new mill will not be made until the water adjacent to it has been analyzed by the experts. Pure water is needed for the bleaching of the linen, any mineral tending to hold the color in instead of eliminating it.

The next regular meeting of the board of directors has been called for December 7, although it is probable that a special meeting will be called as soon as the experts arrive from the east.
