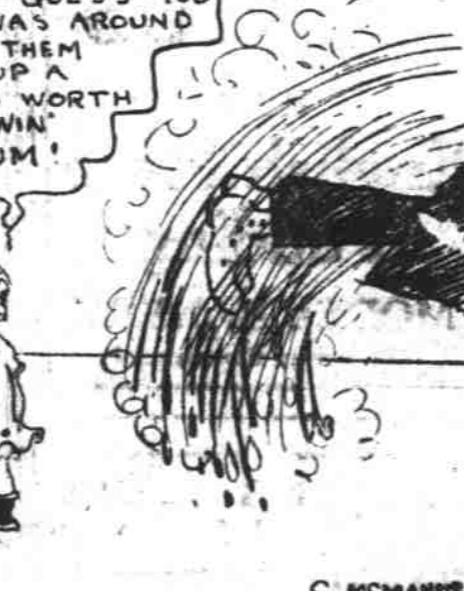
Nunn Elected Manager
