DRAINAGE GROUPS TO MEET TUESDAY

Wider Policy of Reclamation for State May Be Effectuated Next Week

The eleventh annual session of the Oregon State Drainage association is scheduled to be held Tuesday, December 1, in the rooms of the Salem Chamber of Commerce. Officers of the Oregon Irrigation Congress and the trustees of this body have been called to meet in connection with the drainage association. It is expected that the two organizations will unite to introduce a wider policy of reclamation in the state.

Interest in Salem circles is running high for the meeting, as plans have been made for the drainage and reclamation of a large section of land southeast of Salem. Various matters will be discussed at the meeting, including the matter of further "federal aid for the reclamation that will return, for the upbuilding of Oregon the six million dollars in the federal reclamation fund derived from sale of public lands in this state."

The problems of securing successful settlement of farm units on constructed reclamations projects, irrigation of land economic construction of farm drains and improvement of the land through reclamation will be discussed.

TEACHERS' BUREAU CHANGE NECESSARY

Prof. Von Eschen to Relinquish Appointment Service at Willamette

The appointment bureau at Willamette university, which has been conducted by Prof. Florian Von Eschen since its creation in 1924, has been taken over by the administration of the university. Reason was given to be that Prof. Von Eschen already has so many affairs to attend to that a real hardship is worked on him when he has to handle the appointment bureau in addition.

The function of the bureau is to receive teaching posts for graduates of the university. In order to do this most efficiently, Prof. Von Eschen mailed form letters to the superintendents of the school districts in which Willamette students are already teaching, to ascertain whether or not their work has proved satisfactory. He found by so doing that out of 160 teachers only 6 or 7 were found to be criticised in any way, and found that Willamette graduates as a rule are in demand throughout the states of Washington, Idaho, and Oregon. Some districts in Washington, he found, prefer Willamette teachers, and supply from the Salem college whenever it is possible.

Over 300 superintendents in

these states were sent requests to notify the university if vacancies should arise, and by this method Prof. Von Eschen has been able to find teaching posts for all those graduates wishing them, who have

been recommended sufficiently by their professors. Prof. Von Eschen's policy will be continued by the administration and will be made to so systematize the bureau that each graduate in

good standing may receive a teaching post if he so desires. If the spirit of Locarno had ruled at Versailles, there wouldn't have been any need of Locarno.



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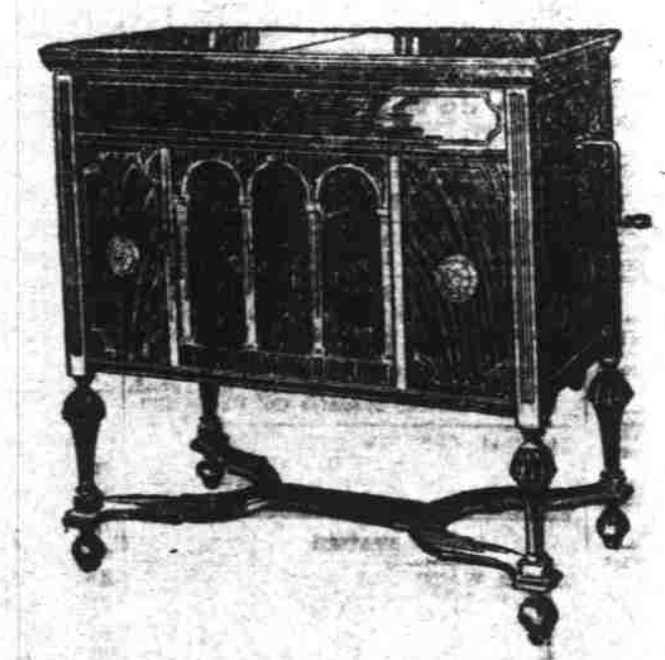
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
