Out of the 37 men receiving employment, 29 were given work as common laborers, seven as agricultural help, and one for restaurant work. One woman was

given employment as a nurse, and two as hotel housekeepers. There were 107 men to seek employment through the bureau, 39 jobs available and 39 men referred. For five jobs open for women, 21 applied, five being referred.
