

SALEM'S FEARLESS GRIDDEERS TO LEAVE FRIDAY FOR MEDFORD CLASH

FEW HI ROOTERS TO FOLLOW SQUAD

Undeclared Eleven Is Tuned for Victory in Season's Final Game

The fearless Salem football aggregation, practically unaccompanied by local rooters, will take the Southern Pacific train number 15 at 11:23 a. m. Friday, December 4, for the city of Medford to lower the pride of that city's victorious high school griddeers. They will leave Medford Sunday night, arriving in Salem at 6:40 a. m. Monday, December 7.

K. A. DeMaris, chief clerk of the Southern Pacific company's Salem office, and Garlen "Spot" Simpson, yell leader at the local high school, will accompany the team on its southern conquest.

Just which Salem warriors will make the trip has not yet been decided by Coach Hollis Huntington, Salem mentor. Some of the men who have been counted on to crash the Medford line are on the injured list, and may not be able to make the trip. J. Drager, tackle, who is equally valuable on the line in defense and offense, Salem's mainstay at punting, and who can be counted on to carry the ball when necessary, has sustained one sprained knee and has water on both knees as the result of the Thanksgiving tilt against Franklin high school of Portland.

Lang, Salem's star full, who has been out of the game most of the season because of a sprained ankle, may not be able to make the trip, as his foot is healing slowly. Eckert is definitely out of it with a sprained ankle.

Those who are practically sure of making the trip are B. Drager,

quarter; Temple, end; Blasco, tackle; Davis and Query, guards; Kelly and Noeske, halves; A. Lyons, full, and H. Lyons, center. The local team is pointing its all in an effort to be victor over the Medford outfit, the game being the last in the season for both high schools. Medford has won all its games throughout Southern Oregon by large scores, and Salem has been undefeated by high schools this season, winning the Willamette valley championship.

STOLEN AUTOS KEEP SALEM POLICE BUSY

Stolen Cars Reported and Record Catch Is Made on Albany Trip

Stolen cars and recoveries seemed to be the order of the day in city police circles Sunday.

The most notable case was that of Peet Stolah of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada, who was arrested by Officer W. O. Edwards and charged with having stolen a car. Traffic Officer Lillard of Albany had phoned local headquarters at

8:55 p. m. Sunday, that a Chevrolet touring had been stolen from that city. Officer Edwards made the arrest of Stolah, who was driving the stolen car, at 9:20 p. m., catching him on South Commercial street as he was coming into the city.

Stolah gave his age as 16 years and, it is said, informed the officers that they "couldn't do anything" to him as he was a minor. Officer Lillard was phoned, and came immediately. Stolah was released to him. When asked why he had stolen the car, Stolah replied: "I wanted the car so that I could get home quickly."

Officer Lillard also reported to local headquarters that a Star roadster, Oregon license number 74-134, and a Ford touring, Oregon license number 123-662, had both been stolen from Eugene Sunday evening.

C. F. Niman of Portland reported Sunday night that his Ford coupe had been stolen while parked in front of 669 North Front street. The car was later recovered at Brooks by state traffic officer Rinehart. It is said that the car had figured in a wreck near Brooks.

CHRISTMAS RATES OFFERED BY ROADS

Low Round Trip Fares for Holidays Announced by Local Agent

Low round trip fares on Southern Pacific lines in Oregon, to all other local Southern Pacific destinations will be offered for the Christmas holidays, according to information received by the local agent.

Lines operating east and north of Portland will have a one and one-half fare rate for the round trip, tickets being on sale December 18 to 25, and also December 29 to January 1, inclusive, with final return limit January 4.

The round trip fares locally on the Southern Pacific will be one and one-third fare for the round trip, which is much lower than previous years, but sale dates and final limits being the same as the preceding, it is stated.

STATE TIMBER SALE WILL BREAK RECORD

Board Will Open Bids for 30,000,000 Feet in Klamath County

The state land board on January 26 of next year will open bids for the sale of approximately 30,000,000 feet of timber located in Klamath county. This is the largest sale of timber ever negotiated by the state land board, according to an announcement made by members of the board. Three thousand acres of land on which the timber stands will not be offered for sale.

The minimum price for 28,665,000 feet of yellow pine has been fixed by the board at \$3.50 per 1000 feet. Approximately 835,000 feet of white fir has been appraised at 50 cents per 1000 feet and 185,000 feet of incense cedar at \$1 per 1000 feet.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check for 25 per cent of the amount involved which will be retained by the board as first payment on the purchase price.

French Novel Losing Hold on People as Times Change

PARIS.—Changed times in Europe are lessening the popularity of the French novel.

People in France are studying more closely economic and social questions. Works on history, costing three times the price of the novel, have found a remarkable sale, and there also has been a revival of editions of Greek and Roman classics in the original text and in translations.

Of the 8987 books published in France last year, only 1148 were novels, while 2908 were on social and economic questions. A comparison of books on sale with those offered before the World war showed a greatly marked improvement in taste.

Child of Soviet Probation Marriage Has No Religion

MOSCOW.—Children born of parents wedded on "probation," a ceremony authorized under the latest Soviet marriage code, are presumed to have no religion until they are 16, when they may choose any form of worship or none at all.
