HILL FEUDS BASIS OF STRONG DRAMA

California Mountains Are Substituted for Hills of North Carolina

Few pictures present such stark realism in setting as "Sun-Up," the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer production directed by Edmund Goulding which is now playing at the Heilig theater. But while the interior scenes of the picture are rough and crude, the exterior scenes have mirrored mountain beauty beyond description.

The locale of the story is laid in the mountains of North Carolina. A duplicate of nature's handiwork was found in the Tehachapi mountains in California and the grandeur of this rugged country has been transferred to the screen with awe-inspiring results.

The interior scenes of the picture consist of the homes of the mountaineers. All the squalor and poverty of these people are reflected in the tumble-down shacks that are their homes. Minute details have been duplicated in these patched huts of dirt and filth with the result that the setting lives and breathes realism.

There are no grand and colorful man-made settings in the picture but the beauty of the mountains have contributed something that no artist could offer.

Edmund Goulding, who directs

his first in "Sun-Up," believes that even inhabitants of the region in which the story is laid will not be able to detect the difference between their own landscapes and those which have been used in the picture. The locations were selected by comparing photographs of quaint and picturesque spots in North Carolina with pictures of similar places in California with marvelous results.

"Sun-Up" is based on the famous Broadway stage success of the same name by Lilla Vollmer. Miss Vollmer lived a considerable time among the hardy people of the Carolina mountain region so that her characters ring with authenticity.

SEVEN SICK CASES LISTED THIS WEEK

Number Not Unusual for Time of Year, Says City Health Officer

There is no startling threat of contagious diseases in Salem, according to a report from the office of city health officer Dr. W. B. Mott, although seven cases have been reported this week. This number is not unusual, at this time of the year, however, according to the report. The cases to be reported this week are two cases of small pox, two cases of diphtheria, two cases of chicken pox and one case of measles.

Those reported this week to have small-pox are Rhapeal Seguin, who lives at 804 South 20th street, a student at Parrish junior high school; and Mrs. Lee E. Yantis, 1630 Ferry street.

The diphtheria cases reported are A. J. Englehart, 1755 Fairmount street; Sterly Cunemiller, 1660 South Winter street, a pupil at Lincoln grammar school.

Those reported to have chicken pox are Margaret Clare, 465 North 20th street and Jay Bertelson, 110 Lefelle street, a pupil at Lincoln grammar school.

Marvin Wright, of 683 North 16th street, is reported to have the measles.

PAROLE IS ASKED FOR BOOTLEGGERS

Sheriff Asks Governor's Aid for Four Men Now Serving Terms

Sheriff R. T. Cookingham of Umatilla county, formerly engaged in the ministry and said by Governor Pierce to be one of the most persistent and efficient liquor sleuths in the entire state, has sent a letter to the executive department here urging that paroles be issued to four bootleggers now serving terms in the Umatilla county jail at Pendleton.

"Some months ago," said Sheriff Cookingham's letter to Governor Pierce, "I wrote you concerning two men, Art Spinning and John Feblen, who were convicted and sentenced to serve one year in jail and pay fines of \$1500 each. Both of these men have wives and children and were in straightened circumstances.

"This caused me to make a plea to you for clemency and parole. These men have pledged me that they never will touch or handle liquor again, and I believe them. They have both been out as trustees and are making good.

"Two other men, Jack Wright and J. S. Swanson, have since been convicted and sentenced to serve 60 days and pay fines of \$500 each for bootlegging. These men have served out their time and have no money to pay their fines."

this various household utensils of unique design are shaped.
