

**AGREEMENT REACHED ON FEDERAL TAX CUT**

to introduce the bill at the opening session of the house Monday, and he intends to ask that it be taken up for consideration on the second day of the session, a record breaking program for speed on such a measure.

A fight for repeal of the automobile passenger car tax had loomed as probably the most serious obstacle confronting the bill

in the house. The automobile manufacturers told the committee that as originally drawn the provisions was likely to result in a slackening of trade with dealers and customers holding back purchases to get the benefit of the revised rate.

The provision agreed upon provided that the reduction shall be effective 30 days after enactment of the bill, and that dealers who have paid the old taxes to manufacturers on cars they hold when it becomes operative, shall recover

the difference. This was estimated by Chairman Green to represent a revenue loss of about \$25,000,000.

Explaining the committee's action in rescinding the retroactive inheritance tax cut which would have eliminated the increased rates inserted in the present revenue act while it was before the house at the last session, Mr. Green said, revised estimates of the treasury showed it would mean a loss of \$70,000,000 to the government this fiscal year.

**VETERINARIANS TO MEET REGULARLY**

**New Organization Formed Will Unite Horse Experts of Valley**

The Willamette Valley Veterinarians association was organized here yesterday when twelve practitioners from valley cities met in the county court rooms and elected officers. The association will draw its membership from veterinarians in the Willamette valley between Portland and Grants Pass.

Dr. G. T. Kornick, of Stayton, was elected president of the organization, Dr. R. J. Nichols of McMinnville, vice president, and Dr. Fred W. Lang of Salem, secretary.

The purpose of the association is to provide a unit of the veterinarians practicing in this territory. Meetings will be held, the main purpose of which will be to discuss veterinarian problems and to provide a round-table at which information will be exchanged. It is said that there are about 60 veterinarians eligible to membership in the association.

A committee has been appointed to draw up a constitution and by-laws. These, it is said, will be closely fashioned after the state association, of which practically all those present are members. No dates have yet been set for meetings.
