SALEM IS HAILED AS CHICK CENTER

Million Will Be Hatched Within 16 Mile Radius of Salem

"Salem is the coming poultry center of the northwest," declared Lloyd A. Lee, local poultry expert in addressing the Marion-Polk county realtors Thursday. "This will not be brought about by a few large chicken farms, but by many small ones."

The poultry industry is becoming specialized, he declared. Formerly the poultry man attended to all parts of the business, and the results were mediocre. Now breeders produce high record hens, some poultry men produce pullets, some run hatcheries, and others pay attention to commercial eggs.

"The need now is for experienced men," he said. Probably 90 percent of the men entering the poultry business fail because they have not enough experience.

Development of the business in the Willamette valley has shown the tendency to produce eggs in comparatively small lots. This is a good thing as they can be attended to properly.

"Ten years ago we were importing eggs by the carloads. Now we are exporting them by the carloads."

"The baby chick industry will be a big thing here. Salem will become the center of the baby chick industry. This year within a radius of 16 miles of Salem a million baby chicks will be hatched."

Mr. Lee said that the poultry business has progressed more rapidly in the past ten years than any agricultural work in the United States. Business amounted to \$25,000,000 last year, or to ten times as much as the output of gold in the United States.

Poultry diseases have been given little attention by the government, but now \$100,000 has been appropriated to fight the diseases. The chicks here are healthy, though. If the diseases can be met with successfully development will mean millions of dollars to the Willamette valley.

"We have a stone wall ahead of us here," Mr. Lee said. "This is finding enough eggs of sufficient quality to maintain the high standards in exporting baby chicks we have set."

"There are two ways of getting around this: either by encouraging the farmers to produce quality eggs, or else put in flocks ourselves."

"From a commercial standpoint the business is a success if the man has thorough experience. Thos. Ostrom, of Oregon City, cleared \$2.76 per hen last year."

"The biggest factor in the success of the business is watching the little things such as feed. If feed is bought efficiently the business should pay."
