TIMBER UNTOUCHED PEAVY TELLS LIONS

Predicts Many Times 43,000 Men Will Be Employed by Industry

"Timber in Oregon has not yet been touched," said Dean George Peavy, of the school of forestry, OAC, in addressing the Lions in session yesterday.

Surveying the timber situation throughout the United States, the speaker stated that 20 per cent was to be found in Oregon, that 22,000 acres of land in the state is good for nothing else.

"I predict that there will be many times 43,000 men employed by the industry within the next few years."

"What shall we do? First we must have complete forest fire protection, we must use our influence that unproductive acres in federal reserves be replanted. Third, if we are going to provide for future forests we should encourage the state to acquire cut-over land for reforestation.

Fourth, we should make it possible for private owners to hold

land for another timber crop by reducing the taxes."

In closing the dean stated that he had to see the people of Oregon sit by and see this great resource go and leave us with devastation.

District Governor of the Lions Club of Oregon, Frank Neer, presided at the meeting and introduced the speaker. Mr. Neer in his introduction, stated that he had spent four years at OAC when Professor Peavy was dean of men. Dean Peavy responded to the introduction, stating that Frank Neer was the biggest problem of his time in college.

Ted Roy, tenor of OAC, accompanied by Byron Arnold, sang several selections for the club.

UNIVERSITY VAULT OPENED WITH BAR

Checks and \$200 in Cash Missing; Records Are Not Disturbed

Willamette university was broken into sometime Wednesday night; \$200 in cash was taken and several hundred dollars in checks. Discovery was made Thursday morning when N. S. Savage, business manager, returned to his office.

Entrance to Eaton hall and to the business office was gained by picking the locks. The vault containing the cash and records of the school was forced open by a crow bar. None of the records was molested.

The money stolen consisted of \$110 belonging to the university, \$60 to the student-body and \$30 football receipts, according to Mr. Savage, who declared this is twice as much money as is usually kept at the office. The office was left in a litter, the knob of the vault, bits of the lock, and the smashed strong box that had contained the money, being left.

Officials of the university are working with local police in an attempt to locate the criminals.
