

COURT HEARS CASE OF BERRY GROWERS

Lentz Presents Arguments in Case Against Cooperative Association

The state supreme court yesterday heard arguments in the case brought by Benjamin Lentz to compel the Oregon Growers Cooperative association to comply with its contracts in connection with the delivery of berries by the growers. The suit originated in Marion county and has twice been appealed to the state supreme court for consideration.

In the first suit the court held that the growers had violated their contracts with the Oregon Growers Cooperative association,

and ordered that the berries be delivered or that they pay to the association money equivalent to the amount involved in the dispute.

It was charged that the growers later attempted to deliver their berries to the association, but that they refused, Mr. Lentz then filed suit to compel the association to accept the berries in compliance with the contracts.

The latter controversy is now before the court for redetermination. There also was argued before the supreme court yesterday the suit brought by the Oregon Growers Cooperative association against Riddle. This suit involves contracts for the delivery of fruits to the association and was appealed from Douglas county.

TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS FOR YEAR SHOW CUT

Total List Falls, Cars in Operation Increase, Kiwanians Hear

Although the department is spending considerable effort in checking auto accidents, Mr. Rafferty said nothing can be done "without the cooperation of citizens."

tariff must apply to agricultural surpluses.
"While the government should

not engage in the buying and selling of commodities, nor the arbitrary fixing of prices, it can take a more active part in finding a better market for our agricultural surplus, that prices of farm products shall not continue out of line with the general price level."

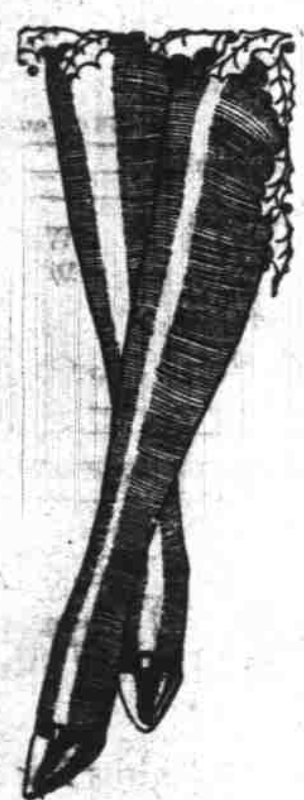

FIRE DAMAGES SHOP OF IRA JORGENSEN

Action of Fighters Prevents More Serious Damage, Loss Unknown

Fire confined almost entirely to the basement of the building of the Ira Jorgensen automotive repair and supply shop called the fire department to 190 South High at Ferry streets Monday afternoon.

When firemen entered the smoke filled building they were at first unable to reach the basement when the electric elevator failed to function. By cutting the elevator cable, Walter Lotis, a shop employee, secured entrance to the fireswept, lower storage floor.

After entering the basement the fire fighters soon controlled the stiff blaze raging directly underneath the tire press. While Mr. Jorgensen and experts have not fixed the cause of the fire it is thought that oil seepage from the press directly overhead might have been a contributing factor.

The estimated loss has not been ascertained. Prompt action by the fire department prevented a more serious blaze as oxygen tank and tires stored in the basement were practically uninjured. The building and contents is covered by insurance, it was stated.

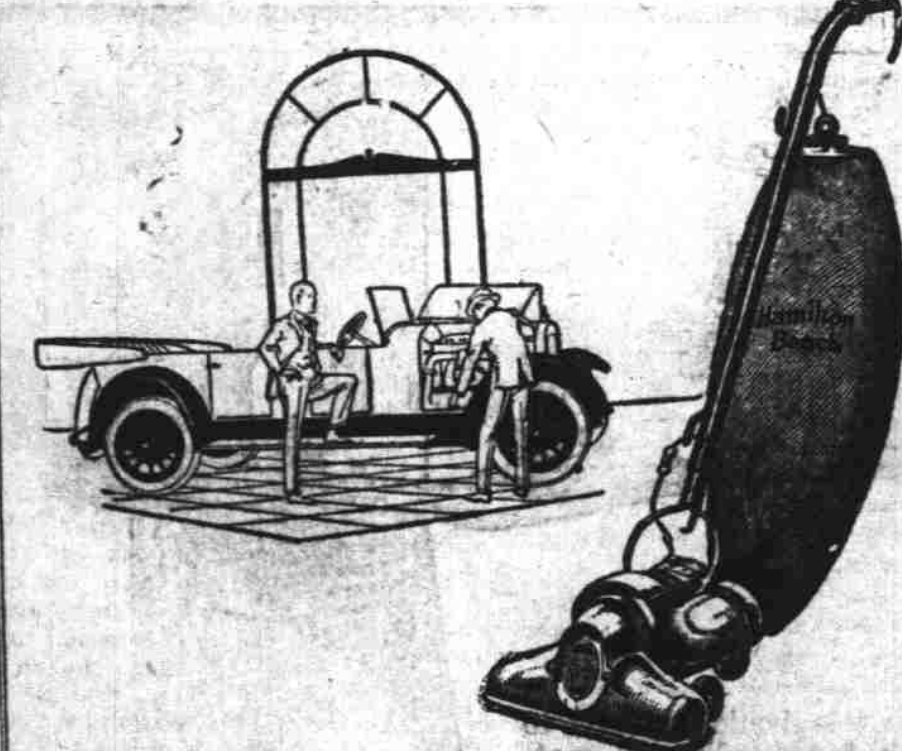
