Used to quell strike outbreak and for general education by missionaries of the American Board

Report to be made at Meeting of the National Council of Congregational Churches, Washington.

The use of motion pictures to quell a strike outbreak and to restore order in the great mining camp at Johannesburg, South Africa...

Mr. Bridgman and his assistant the Rev. Ray E. Phillips are stationed at Johannesburg where are located the vast mines of the Rand.

Miner authorities provide for the physical nature; they feed and house him well, but as yet have provided nothing in the way of wholesome outlet for his social nature.

In 1922 a strike broke out among the workers that threatened not only the mines but the city as well.

Then it was that Mr. Bridgman and Mr. Phillips brought in their moving picture machines...

The effect was immediate. The blacks roared at the comics, were amused by the other pictures and after a short time the temper had so changed that they cheered the missionaries...

This biennial report of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions will show that the board has on its rolls 780 missionaries, ministers, educators, translators, physicians, nurses, industrial and agricultural experts and business agents.

Amusing things happen during the shows. In a certain compound the compound manager and other mine officials were present with other friends.

Among other methods to interest and educate these natives used by Mr. Bridgman and Mr. Phillips are Native Boy Scouts, called "Pathfinders" and athletic leagues for the boys.

A lecture group is conducted for educated native men who have studied in school...

The missionaries can guide the channels which shall mean life abundant. We believe we are in Africa by the purpose of God to solve the racial difficulties as well as to have individual Africans.

In addition to Mr. Bridgman other speakers who will take part in the program of the American board meeting are Dr. George E. White of Salonica, Greece...

International Games Held in Germany for Workers

FRANKFURT—The first international Olympic games for working classes took place recently in the new Frankfurt stadium and through the five days attracted more than 250,000 spectators.

The Frankfurter Volksstimme recorded the games in German, English and French.
