There were two fatalities due to industrial accidents in Oregon during the week ending December 10, according to a report prepared here by the state industrial accident commission. The victims included McClellan Black, powder worker of Coquille, and Vajo Maranchich, laborer, with headquarters at Medford. Of the 597 accidents reported during the week 483 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act and 114 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the law.
