WHITMAN BOYS GET CONSOLATION PRIZE

Anderson Byrd High Point Man for Tournament, Totals 35 Points

Championship of the Anderson Junior League goes to the YMCA Junior Leaders by virtue of their victory yesterday afternoon over the Parrish Juniors, the score being 23-8. Each member of the championship team will receive a silver basket ball bob.

Seldom did they try to assume the offense. As a result, they took but few shots at their hoop. The Leaders also exhibited superb passing work. They were aggressive throughout the game, playing most of the time in the territory of the Juniors.

Longhead and Heise were the outstanding players for the Leaders. Longhead was responsible for 12 points, and Heise converted 9. Heise, at center, usually won the ball on the toss up.

Nash, with six points, was high score man for the Juniors. He was also the chief man in the Junior offense system. Kitchen was outstanding in defense. Each team played six men.

NEW NORTHWEST SPORT CONFERENCE WILL ASSIST SMALL COLLEGES

ERICKSON NAMED FIRST PRESIDENT

Group Includes Willamette, Pacific, Linfield, Whitman Teams

A new conference came into being in Pacific northwest Athletic circles, composed of the smaller schools, according to special wire from Seattle to The Statesman. The organization was decided upon by representatives of the smaller schools at a meeting in Tacoma Friday evening, but was not revealed until the meeting of the Northwest conference yesterday.

The new conference was to be known as the "Oregon Trial Collegiate conference," but as Coast conference teams officially withdrew from the Northwest conference yesterday, the new conference will be known as the Northwest conference.

Schools comprising the conference are Willamette university of Salem; Pacific university of Forest Grove; Linfield college of McMinnville; College of Idaho at Caldwell; Whitman college at Walla Walla, Wash.; and College of Puget Sound, at Tacoma.

Prof. Frank Erickson, dean of men at Willamette university, faculty representative on Willamette's permanent athletic board, was elected president of the conference. H. L. Hopkins of Pacific university was elected secretary.

Creation of the conference was the result of considerable criticism of the formation of the old Northwest conference. It was held that with the larger schools in the conference, the smaller schools had little if any chance of placing as champions.

It is thought that creation of the smaller school conference, in which each school will have equal chance at the honors, will stimulate interest considerably in the athletic endeavors of the smaller schools.

The new conference goes into effect immediately. The basketball season will be the first in which the smaller schools will have equal chances at the honors.
