FRENCH STUDY SEX CHANGE IN ANIMALS

PARIS.—Experiments in the changing of the sex of various animals, coincident to an attempt to codify the laws governing all animal growth, are now being carried on with success under the auspices of the Paris Faculty of Medicine by Dr. Christian Champy.

Starting some five years ago with experiments on the frog and

other amphibians, wherein the change of sex from male to female was accomplished by an alternate process of starving and then fattening, Dr. Champy by means of gland grafting has been able to change the sexes of such mammals as the guinea-pig and rabbit. The Russian savant Zavadowsky has performed similarly successful grafting on chickens.

As a result of their combined labors great progress has been made in determining the physical laws governing animal growth, to the point that Dr. Champy hopes that in the not distant future they may be laid down as confidently in the biological field as in physics and chemistry.

The composition of the creative glands of all males and females from the insect kingdom up to that of the higher animals, says Dr. Champy, presents a surprising sameness. The effects which the male and female glands have on the outward growth of any one species—such as horns, hair, shell, and so forth—can now to a certain degree be charted and catalogued.

It is now possible, the French savant points out, to determine the sex of prehistoric animals by an examination of the remains by the application of the general law, and also to compose the picture

and calculate the size of the creature of the opposite sex from an examination of any one specimen found.

There is a practical aim behind this studying of the normal laws

of growth, Dr. Champy observes. Once they are established, it will be easier to get at the causes of abnormal growths. First among the abnormal growths to be considered will be those of cancer.
