## Outstanding Christmas Pageant at First Methodist Church Tomorrow

The Christmas pageant to be presented at the First Methodist church Sunday evening at 7:30 p. m. is entitled "Followers of the Star." The pageant, directed by Miss Mary E. Findley, assisted by Mrs. Donald W. Riddle as director of the junior choir, and by Miss Minnie Miller at the organ, opens with a prophecy from Isaiah. The prophecy is followed by the approach of the Wise Men, who assemble—as though in the desert—where they complete their plans to go in search of the Christ child, foretold to be born in Bethlehem or Judea. Scene II reveals a night scene, disclosing where the shepherds are heard talking earnestly together and wondering at the strangeness of the night. Suddenly they are aware of glad tidings and they decide to hasten to Bethlehem. Following the manager scene, which follows, the audience is immediately invited to recall the blessings that are ours today because of that night.

Scene IV, "The Spirit of the Church," challenges the Youth of today and he accepts the challenge, whereupon he questions the Spirit of the Church as to the blessings shed upon us in the light of that Star.
