

LUMBER SHIPMENTS SHOW MARKED RISE

Twenty One Million More Feet Sent By Columbia River Than in 1924

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 18.—According to figures furnished by the traffic department of the Port of Portland, Ore., shipments of lumber from the Columbia river, including Portland, during the month of November amounted to 91,042,813 feet. This is an increase of 21,772,915 feet over November 1924.

The total shipments for the year during the first eleven months of 1925 has amounted to 1,053,246,033 feet. The increase in shipment from the Columbia river during the year 1925 is shown when it is considered that the total shipments for the entire year of 1924 amounted to 829,623,197 feet or an increase of 224,000,000 feet already for the year.

As in previous years, the bulk of the exports have been delivered in Japan, with 94,000,000 feet from Portland and 41,000,000 feet from lower Columbia river ports. The second country in point of receipts of lumber has been Australia with 37,000,000 feet from Portland and 43,000,000 feet from lower Columbia river ports.

Shipments during the past year have been made to nine European countries, the larger shipments going to the United Kingdom which received 22,000,000 feet from Portland and 17,000,000 feet from down river ports.

Intercoastal shipments from the Columbia river have amounted to 22,155,504 feet of which 140,000,000 feet has been loaded at Portland, and 82,500,000 feet at lower Columbia river ports.

Shipments in all have been made to sixteen different eastern and fruit cities. Shipments to intercoastal ports show a great increase over the year 1924 when the total shipments from Portland were 116,000,000 feet and from Astoria were 46,000,000 feet.

of lumber. In connection with the mill they have a modern and complete sash and door factory also a box factory.

The Oregon Pulp and Paper company manufactures nearly fifty five tons of all grades of paper a day. Its central location is especially adapted to this industry because of surrounding forests of pulp wood.

Another of the important industries recently established is the Valley Packing company. It packs about one hundred and twenty million pounds annually.

Other industries that play an important part are the canneries. The largest of these are the Oregon Packing company and Hunt's cannery which handle large amounts of fruits and vegetables.

Salem's newest industry, which we believe will soon be a leading one, is the manufacturing of flax. These industries and others of less importance are the source of employment of many people.

In the last few years Salem has grown rapidly. Many people have come to Salem from the east, have built homes, and found employment. With the growth of these industries more people will continue to come.

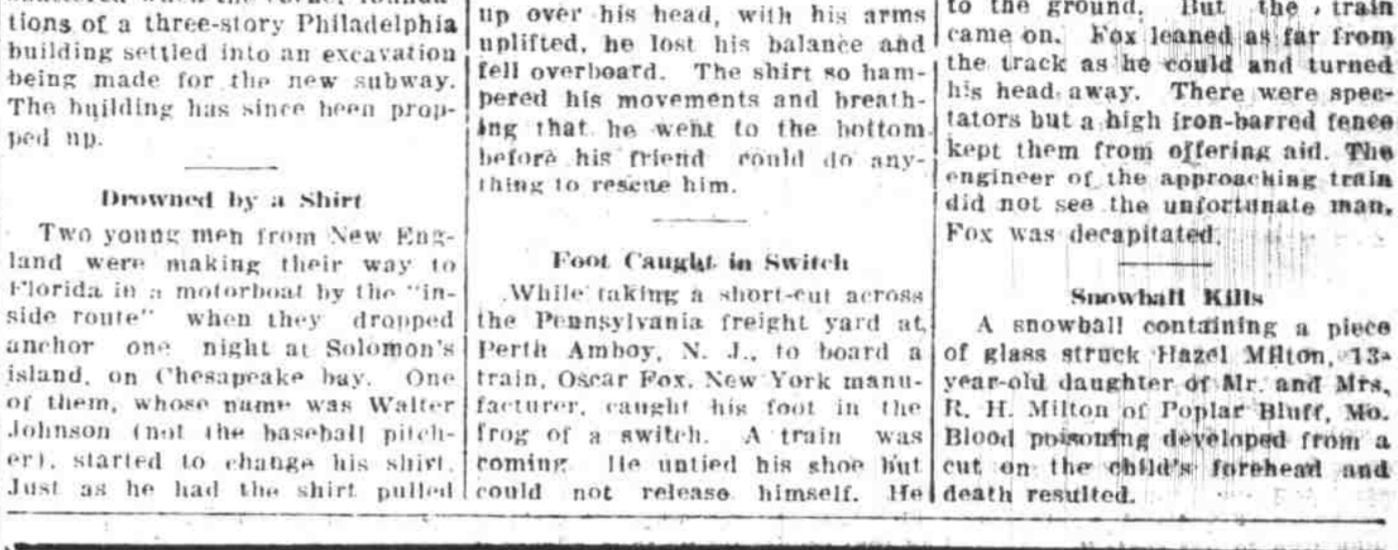
