

### OAC CLASS WILL STUDY MARKETING

Directors of Cooperative Associations Will Meet at Corvallis

An intensive study of the purposes and methods of cooperative marketing will be the aim of a school for directors and members of cooperative associations to be held at the Oregon Agricultural college, Corvallis, February 1, 2 and 3, 1926, announces the college extension service. This event is scheduled at the request of the Oregon cooperative council, which in a special meeting at Corvallis, Oct. 12, asked the college to prepare a course of study for cooperative marketing leaders. Instructors in this school will include marketing experts from the bureau of agricultural economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in addition to members of the college faculty, says C. J. Hard, extension specialist in marketing, who is in charge of arrangements. "Walter Peet, secretary of the national council of cooperative associations has promised to be present unless matters before Congress make it impossible for him to leave Washington, D. C., at the time the time the school is to be held." Among the subjects selected for study are: "The history of cooperative marketing in Europe and America; economic basis of marketing; factors entering into price making; reasons for organizing marketing associations; aims and purposes of cooperative marketing; and some things that cooperative marketing cannot do. Discussion of duties and responsibilities of directors will occupy the third day of the session. Several leading bankers and directors of large corporations in the state will be asked to take part in this feature.

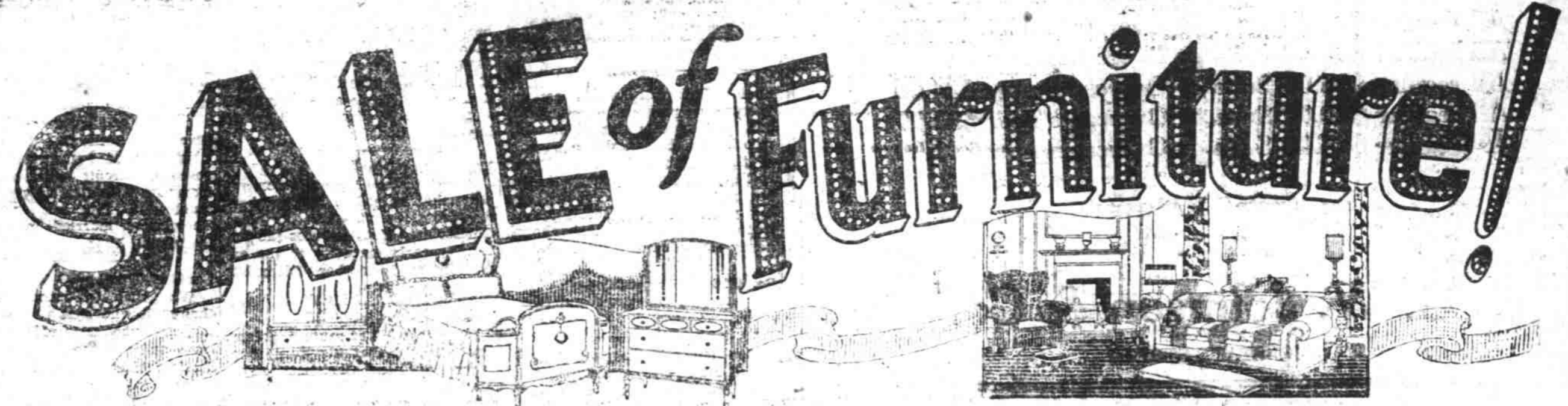
