Employment Report Filed—Last week 28 men and two women received employment through the Salem YMCA employment bureau, according to report submitted by Sims Phillips, in charge of the bureau. There were 83 men to register for jobs, but only 28 calls for help were received. Men were referred and placed for each job offered. Twenty-one women sought employment through the bureau. For this number but two jobs were called in, two women were referred and both placed.

Urged to Wire—Members of the Oregon public service commission yesterday were urged to send telegrams to Senator C. L. McNary and Robert N. Stanfield requesting them to vote

against the confirmation of Richard V. Taylor and Thomas F. Woodlock, who have been recommended by President Coolidge as members of the interstate commerce commission. The telegram asking the Oregon public service commission to interfere in the confirmation of the proposed members of the interstate commerce commission was received from the public service commission of the state of Louisiana. Members of the Oregon commission indicated that they would not comply with the request.

Firecrackers Allowed—For anybody who wants to shoot firecrackers to celebrate the new year, will be absolutely permissible, as Mayor Giesey said yesterday that it would be allowed on that occasion. Blank cartridges may be used in guns, but bullets are barred. The general demand for firecrackers on New Year's night, and that little danger of fire at this time of year are reasons given by the mayor.
