

**ANNUAL LUTHERAN MEET JANUARY 12**

Election of Officers, Business Program for Gathering Announced

SILVERTON, Or., Dec. 28.—(Special.)—The Lutheran Brotherhood of Silvertown will hold its annual meeting and election in the St. Johns church on January 12. The annual election and business meeting will be held at 2 o'clock.

**BOYS, FOUR TONS, VISIT INDUSTRIES**

County, City YMCA Take 98 Youths on First Inspection Tour

County and city YMCA's united yesterday in escorting nearly 8,000 pounds of boys through the penitentiary and state hospitals. There were 98 boys to make the trip, most of them pupils in rural schools from all parts of Marion county.

Before the boys entered the penitentiary they were weighed, summing up 7800 pounds. The boys were escorted by Ben J. Kimber, county secretary, and J. B. Crary, secretary of boys' work at the Salem YMCA.

Flax plant at the penitentiary proved to be the object of greatest interest to the boys. Interest was also manifested in the handiwork of prisoners on display at the penitentiary.

Ben Kimber continued the trip for his county boys on into the afternoon. Immediately after they had lunch, they were given a demonstration by the Salem fire department, in front of the station on Chemeketa street. The firemen, to the delight of the boys, climbed into the steeple of the fire house by use of the new hook and ladder.

Valley Packing plant was the next location to be visited. The boys were divided into two groups, and taken through the entire plant, the process of meat-packing being explained to them. Miles Linen mill was also visited. Questions were fired right and left at employees as the boys were led through the plant and shown the process of twine making.

The day's trip drew to a close with a visit to the Oregon Paper & Pulp company's mill. Here the boys were shown the process involved in the making of paper.

Today the city YMCA, under the leadership of Mr. Crary, will visit the Valley Packing company's plant and the Miles Linen mill.

**CHADWICK ACCEPTS PORTLAND POSITION**

Experienced Assistant State Engineer Will Enter Manufacturing

H. M. Chadwick, assistant state engineer since 1923, has resigned his position to accept employment with a manufacturing concern in Portland.

Mr. Chadwick is an associate member of the American Society of Civil Engineers, and in this capacity was connected with irrigation development in New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming, Montana and Oregon. He was employed in Western Colorado as resident engineer on the construction of a mountain canal containing three tunnels and much open channel rock and earth work. This was in the latter part of 1909 and 1910.

Mr. Chadwick later was connected in Oregon as chief engineer for the Rogue River Canal company and in this capacity had charge of the design and construction of the Medford Irrigation district. He continued in this employment until 1923 when he was appointed assistant state engineer.

Mr. Chadwick had supervision of the construction of the Jordan Valley Irrigation district in Malheur county. This district was completed at a cost of \$40,000 under the engineer's estimate.

**SALEM FILIPINOS TO MARK HOLIDAY**

Birth of Jose Rizal, Island Hero, to Be Celebrated at School

The principal address of the evening will be given by Carl G. Doncy, president of Willamette university. Miss Gladys McIntyre of the school of music at Willamette will sing, and members of the orchestras of Corvallis and Portland will give a special string concert in Waller hall half an hour before the main program begins. It is stated by the Filipinos that in connection with their program there will be no charge of any kind.
