BUS OPERATORS ASK LICENSE FEE FACTS

Request Recourse Should Law Be Called Unconstitutional

Corporations affected by the new law enacted at the last session of the legislature providing that commercial vehicles which operate five miles beyond the boundaries of any incorporated town or city shall pay a license fee on their machines 50 per cent in excess of that demanded under the old law, have sent letters to Salem inquiring how they will obtain refunds in event the new license law pertaining to commercial vehicles is held to be unconstitutional.

A suit to test the constitutionality of the law increasing the license fee on these commercial vehicles was filed in the state supreme court here a few days ago but as yet the court has given no indication as to when a decision will be forthcoming.

Most of the corporations affect-

ed by the new license law have tendered checks to the secretary of state covering the 50 per cent increase in fees. This money, after being turned over to the state treasurer by the secretary of state cannot be withdrawn in whole or in part except by an act of the legislature.

This means, attorneys said, that in event the new license law is declared invalid, corporations that obtained licenses for their cars by paying the 50 per cent increase, may have to wait until the legislature convenes next year to demand their refunds.

would enable it to transmit light and to account for the optical phenomena in general. The ether was at first presumed to fill all space, even that occupied by material bodies and yet to allow all bodies to move through it with apparent freedom. The question of whether the ether is carried along by the earth's motion has been considered from the early days of the (Hight) wave theory. Theories of the ether are intimately associated with theories of the structure of matter and these are among the most fundamental in the whole domain of physical science.

Dr. Farrell, who succeeded Dr. William M. Jardine as president of the Kansas State Agricultural college quoted a passage from the Edinburgh Review of 1834, describing the "desert" in which Kansas and Nebraska are now located.

"There," the review says, "lies the desert—except in a few spots on the borders of the rivers, incapable, probably forever, of fixed settlement—so complete is the aridity that the great rivers—the Platte, Arkansas and Rio Grande—dry up altogether on the plains in summer.

"The change was brought about through research in field and laboratory and exploration in every country in search of useful plants have produced new facts, new plants and new machines," Dr. Farrell said. "These have been eagerly taken up by the people having the spirit of the pioneer and their use has been fruitful."
