

Salem High Five To Tackle Lincoln, Portland Squad Here Tomorrow

TEAM SETS STRIDE AGAINST FRANKLIN

Local Boys Maintain Lead Throughout Tuesday's Game in Portland

Salem high school hoopers are slated to "back" up against the strongest opposition so far this season Friday night when they meet the Lincoln high school five of Portland on the Salem high school gym floor.

Lincoln placed second in the Portland basketball league last season. Franklin was first. But Scallon and Epps, who were largely responsible for the success of the Quaker team, have left the school. Epps graduating and Scallon going to Hollywood to play with the high school there.

Lincoln, according to report, has retained most of her lettermen, and predictions in Portland have it that she will place at the top of the Portland list this season.

If this should come about, then the game Friday night will be a fair indication of Salem's strength for the start of the Willamette valley league season.

Reports concerning the Salem-Franklin game played in Portland Tuesday night revealed that Salem has at last found her stride, and is in shape for the season. Although the Quakers had beaten them but a few nights before, the Salem boys, out for blood, are reported to have played such a game that Franklin could hardly be called in the running at any stage in the contest.

Duffy, the shortest man on the team, was largely responsible for the big lead Salem maintained. It is reported that he was shooting baskets from all angles of the floor. He proved equally good on long shots and shots under the basket.

J. Drager, last year's all-state center, is reported to have come out of the mediocre game he had been playing and to have all but shared honors with Duffy. He dunked in two or three baskets from the center of the floor, according to the report.

The team that met Franklin in Portland was an entirely different team from the one that met Franklin in Salem. There are some whisperings that a little talking to was meted just prior to the game. It is, "It had its effect."

Lineup to start against Lincoln Friday night will probably be: Duffy and Nash at forwards; J. Drager at center; B. Drager and Olinger at guards. If Ashby is found eligible, he might be put in at guard and Olinger put at forward in place of Nash. H. Lyons will probably get his chance at forward before the game ends, and might even start in the lineup.

BEARCATS TO MEET ALBANY FIVE HERE

Winners of 1925 Willamette Valley Title Said to Have Strong Team

Willamette university's basketball quintet will be pitted against the Albany college team Saturday night. The game is to be played on the floor of the Willamette gymnasium, and is to start promptly at 8 o'clock, according to Coach Guy L. Rathbun.

Albany college won the Willamette valley conference last year. They are said to have a fast team this year and to have several veterans back. Fact that they are quite eager for the game is thought by some Willamette fans to indicate that they are figuring on packing a surprise with them.

The Bearcats have started out the season with a barnstorming conquest during which the regular team was not defeated once. In the game with Washougal the Bearcats came out with one point less than their opponents. Hartley, veteran center, and Robertson, veteran forward, were not in the game, however. Collisum beat the second team of the Bearcats, but were decisively defeated by Willamette's first team.

The good start in the barnstorming season has led local fans to believe that Willamette's chances stand pretty well to the fore in regard to taking the northwest conference championship this year.

First conference game will be played next Tuesday night. At this time Willamette will play Linfield on the Willamette floor. Linfield, according to reports reaching here from Coach Pettit, has a light but fast team this year.

During the last three or four years Linfield has won more than her share of the games with Willamette. With a conference standing at stake, however, it is expected the Bearcats will do what they can to keep the long side of the score under their name.

PARRISH TOSSERS TO FACE STAYTON

Parrish junior high school basketball team will meet the Stayton high school quintet Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock. The game is to be played in Salem.

Parrish is reported to have a strong team this season, although but one letterman has returned. Young Kelly, kid brother of Don Kelly, Salem's football captain, is the letterman. Kelly is reported to be going like a whirlwind this year, and so far has stood out as the best basket shooting bet for the junior high.

Stayton, it is said, has a strong fast team this year. If reports coming in are correct, Stayton will have it over the local boys in weight and in height. They have four lettermen back. The Parrish lads are smaller than usual this year, according to Coach Frank Brown. But what they lost in height they gain in speed, it is said.

Siegmund at guard is considered a good defensive man, and is an excellent shot as well. Anderson at center is also reported to be playing a good game.

Parrish has played two games this season so far, splitting the victories. She won from the Turner high school team, but lost to Perrydale.

Although Stayton is said to have the best of Friday night's contest in weight and in height, the local lads are favorites for the game. Last year's record, coupled with revelation of speedy work so far this season has won confidence for the team.

SCHAEFER IS AGAIN WORLD'S CHAMPION

Young Jake Schaefer Regains Title in Match With Belgian Champion

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—Young Jake Schaefer, twice former champion, today regained the world's title at 18.2 balk line billiards to the United States when he defeated Edouard Horemans, Belgian title holder, 1500 to 899 after three 500 point blocks of play.

The score for the final 500 point block today was:
Schaefer, 500; Horemans, 318.

Schaefer compiled the phenomenal average of 93 12-16 for his 16 innings during the two nights and afternoon of play. It has not been long, however, since the loser's average of 55 10-16 would have been considered excellent.

From the opening inning Monday night Horemans was forced to fight an uphill battle and virtually no one credited him with a chance after Schaefer took the first block, 500 to 375.

When the little champion emerged from last night's play with a deficit of 428 points, his chance to retain the title virtually was nullified.

Despite Horemans' extremely poor showing when his total compared with Schaefer's, he twice scored higher runs than the American. Horemans' 243 in the final inning of the opening block was the high run of the match and his 231, scored today in his dying effort to retain the championship, was better than anything Schaefer could do.
