CASHMAN RESTING WELL IN HOSPITAL

Expected to Recover Despite Broken Shoulder Blade, and Bruises

Henry Cashman, who was seriously hurt in an auto accident near the Spaulding Lumber company's mill Tuesday, is improving rapidly, according to report received from the Deaconess hospital last night.

It was thought when he was first taken to the hospital that his injuries might prove fatal. He sustained a broken shoulder blade, face cuts and several bruises. His constitution, in spite of his 60 years, was reported strong, however.

Mr. Cashman, an employee at the mill, was standing on the curb near front and Ferry, talking to a friend during the lunch hour. He started across the street when a car driven by W. J. Waterhouse of West Salem approached. Mr. Waterhouse sounded his horn, and Cashman turned to get back to the curb, but was struck.

Waterhouse called the Golden ambulance immediately and Cashman was taken to the hospital.

BIBLE BILL THREATENED WASHINGTON SENATE FAILS TO APPROVE MEASURE

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 6.—(By Associated Press.)—A proposed constitutional amendment permitting the legislature of Washington to authorize the reading of the Bible in public schools and educational institutions of the state without comment failed by two votes to secure the necessary two-thirds majority in the senate here today. The bill had been adopted by the house and had it been oked by the senate and governor would have been submitted to the voters of the state.

It is the second Bible bill to meet defeat in the senate this session.


