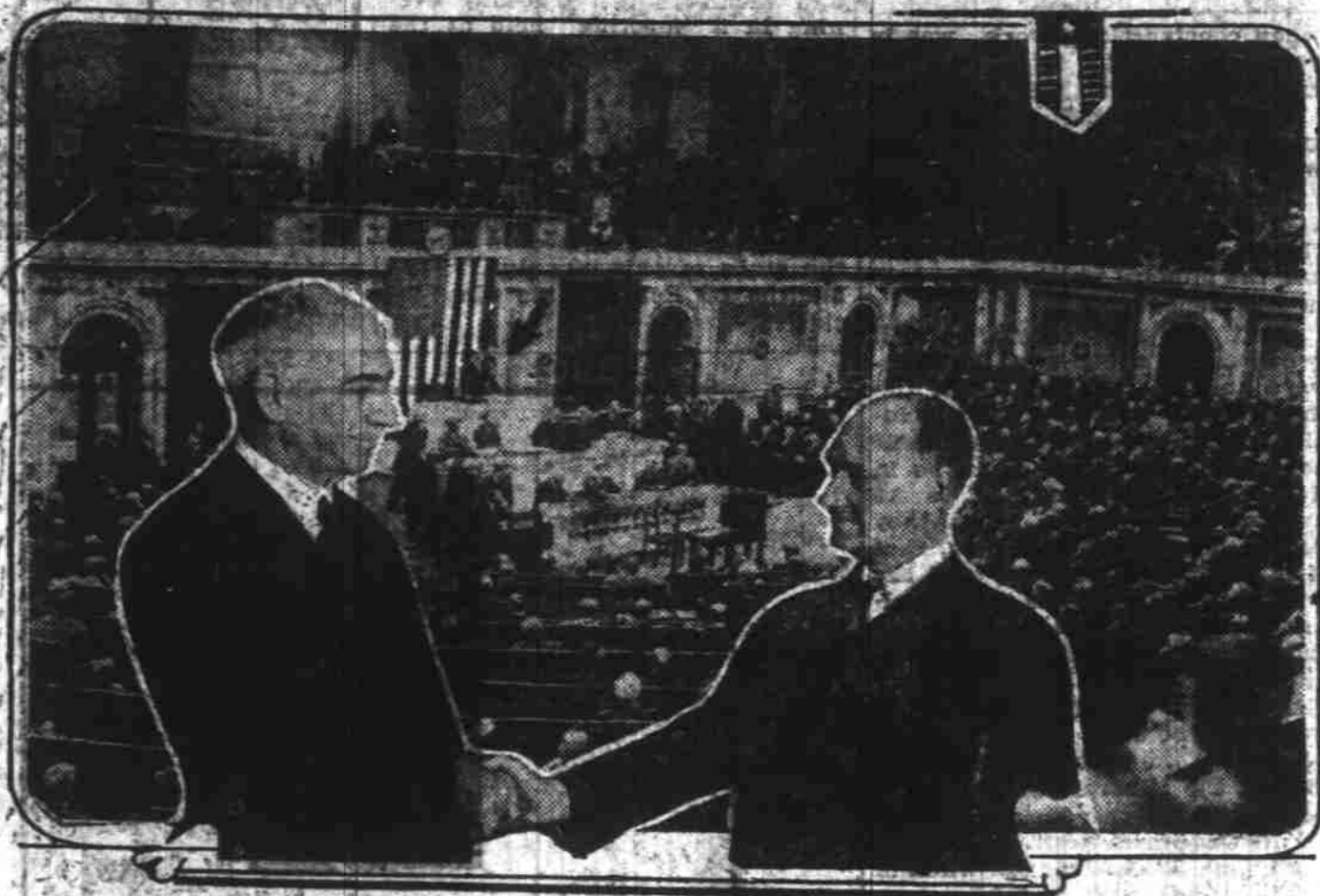

Death Chair Ending San Antonio's "Black Terror"



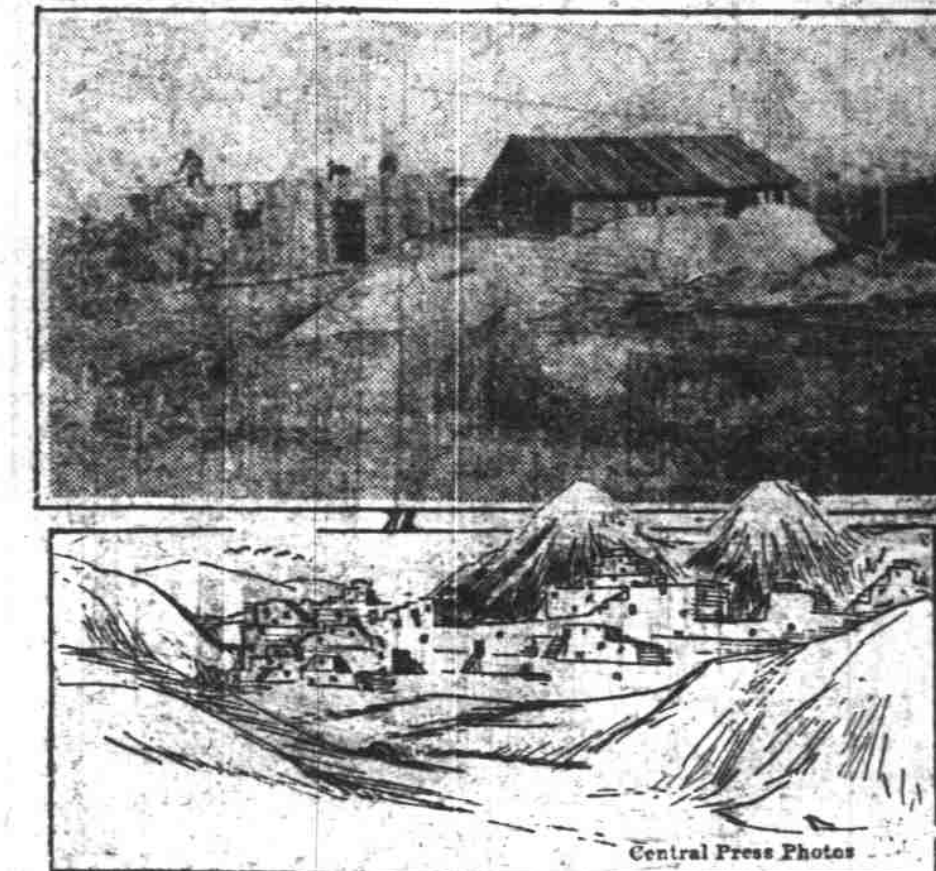
