

CARLOADS OF STUDENTS TO FOLLOW SALEM HIGH FIVE TO DALLAS FOR GAME

SALEM HAS ODDS ON HARD CONTEST

Outcome Uncertain Unless Strikes Stride of 1925 Season

Coach Huntington's Salem high school men will journey to Dallas this evening to meet the high school hoopers of that city. Last year Salem high beat Dallas high by a sizable score. The game was closer, however, than the score indicated.

The Dallas team improved wonderfully as the season progressed last year, finally defeating independence high school 3-2. Practically all of the men on last year's team were beginners, and have returned. It is understood, to play with Dallas again this season.

Consequently, Coach Huntington is none too optimistic over the outcome of this evening's game. While the Salem team has won two out of three of its high school games this season, the team has not hit its regular stride as yet.

Whether or not the boys will settle into their pace for the Dallas game is the question that is asked. A hard game is expected, although the local boys are considered the favorites.

Coach Huntington is planning to start his regular lineup. This will include Marsh and Duffy, forwards; J. Drager, center; and R. Drager and Oliver, guards. H. Lyons, Adams, Blum and possibly one or two others will be taken along for the reserve force.

Every evening the boys have been scrimmaging at the high school gymnasium. Coach Huntington, for the past week, has been stressing getting the ball down the floor, and making the best of the chances to score. The boys this season have too often dribbled down the floor, only to drive smack into a nest of opposition, declares Coach Huntington.

Doing away with long shots is also being stressed. The coach is attempting to impress upon his men the importance of close in shots.

The team will make the trip by auto. There will be several carloads of rooters to make the Dallas trip for the game. Students at the high school are especially desirous of beating the Dallas boys in order to have a clear record when they meet the Corvallis high school team this Friday night at Corvallis. Saturday afternoon Salem will play the OAC rocks.

Visitor's Stock Will Jump if Bearcats Fail to Hold Strong Lead

Willamette university will play the basketball team from Linfield college at the Willamette gymnasium this evening at 7:30 o'clock. The game is the first conference game to be played by any of the schools in the reorganized northwest conference. Incidentally, this basketball season marks the first contest of the newly shaped conference.

The Bearcats held a short work out last night, concentrating in scrimmaging with the rocks. Passing has been stressed by Coach Rathbun for the last two weeks and the team is showing remarkable improvement in this phase of the game.

While Willamette is thought to have the stronger team, and while the Bearcats are slated to win this evening, Linfield's victory, it is reported, is not coming to Salem without aspirations.

Linfield was admitted into the conference only a short time before the present basketball season. This is her first game in a conference of large standing. Her stock, naturally, will be boosted above par if she can execute the unexpected, and slip Willamette the short end of the score.

According to word received from Coach Pettit, Linfield this year has a fast but light team. No man on her team, according to the impression gathered by Coach Rathbun, is as tall as Hartley, the Willamette center. Consequently, Willamette should receive the ball on the take-off the greater part of the time.

If Linfield's speed is enough to warrant the report that the team is fast, she will rely on that asset to neutralize the advantage the Bearcats have in height and in weight.

Either Litchfield or Robertson will start at forward. If Litchfield starts there, Robertson will be switched to guard. Farnacht will play the other forward berth. Hartley will be in at center and Erickson and Fletcher will start at guard.

Linfield is bringing three freshmen to Salem. The lineup to start will be Marsh and Martin at forward, Wakeman at center, and Trawin and Martin at guard. Coach Pettit will also bring along Heines, Pugh, Bollen, Rieder and Manning.

BROWN-JONES GO SET FOR TONIGHT

Will Wisconsin or Utah Claim Title After Bout, Is Question

Will Wisconsin or Utah claim the western wrestling welterweight belt after tonight?

That is the question to be settled at the Salem armory this evening when Henry Jones, present title holder, and Ted Brown, Wisconsin state title wearer, meet.

Ted Brown is the slim young stranger who, having defeated all comers in his own territory, came west for the purpose of grabbing the inter-mountain trophy. He has met and grappled with Jack Reynolds, world's title holder, and came away unscathed from a struggle with Essano Singh, Hindoo wrestler.

Jones, for his own record, has nothing to be ashamed of. In 13 years he has met the cream of all contenders in his class and with the exception of his recent brief relinquishment to Robin Reed, has worsted 'em all.

Tonight's match means much for the wrestling game in Salem. For several years wrestling had a bad name with local fans. Matches of questionable nature and mere exhibitions advertised as genuine contests had killed the local gate receipts.

However, no one claims any frame-up in the seriousness of the recent three matches between Henry Jones and Robin Reed and Jones and Maurus at Albany where the boys gave the best they had and falls came hard and fast.

The match between Robin Reed and Roy Carver broke the ice here several weeks ago and gave welterweight wrestling a good name. That match brought a \$250 house, which though small, was the largest in Salem for years. The last four matches in Albany drew an attendance netting from \$600 to \$1800.

Both Brown and Jones wrestle after the Mike Yokel school. Of course their individual systems differ but both men use the shifting body and varied toe-holds.

Jones has built for himself the reputation of having fully developed the toe-hold "stopper system" that for over 13 years enabled him to demoralize the attack of any opponent, and has kept for him the title. Both Jones and Brown use the flying mare and airplane spin. In this latter hold Jones is much feared as he has a rather startling trick of applying this hold when least anticipated and hurling his opponent to the mat with crushing force.

Matchmaker Harry Plant has arranged for at least one brief but fast preliminary. The names of the wrestlers for these lead-up matches will be announced from the mat.

TRI-CITY SHOOT TEAM IS NAMED

Second Try Out Set for Sunday, if Contest Date Is Not Advanced

Tentative 10 man team to represent the Salem Rod and Gun club in the tri-city, Salem, Eugene, Corvallis shoot, were chosen Sunday on a basis of best score in a 100 bird contest.

Ranked according to scores, the following were named team members:

Harold Looney, Jefferson, who broke 95 out of 100 targets; Dr. G. E. Prime and Victor Beckman tied with a record of 92 each; Tom Wolgamott, 90; Dick Hunsell, 88; Clarence Downe, 87; Habermann, 86; Grant Farris, 84; Earl Bahlburg, 84; Terrill, 83; Jim Patterson, 79; Blaisdell, 71 and Simon, 68.

Probable date for the first shoot of the series is January 24, at Eugene. The next shoot will be seven or 14 days later at Corvallis, and the third seven or 14 days later at Salem. In case the date for the first shoot is not advanced, a second try-out will be held on Sunday at the club house.

"Scores of the try-out shoot," said Dr. Prime last night, "indicate progressive improvement in marksmanship of all club shooters. Salem has the largest number of amateur shots of any town outside of Portland. It is confidently believed that Salem can and will, during the tournament, produce 10 of the best marksmen in the state of Oregon, outside of Portland."

The team winning two of the three matches will carry off the tournament. In addition to the prestige so gained, possession of

a beautiful silver trophy, purchased by the clubs, will be emblematic of the championship. Each contest will consist of 50 targets per man. Scores will be tallied for ten men, the greatest number of targets broken in 500 shots will indicate the standing of the team.

LANGLEY HAS RESIGNED

REVIEW IS REFUSED IN CASE OF KENTUCKY SOLON

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—(By Associated Press.)—The resignation of Representative Langley, republican, Kentucky, was received and accepted today by the house. It was tendered in a letter after the supreme court had refused to review his conviction for violation of the prohibition laws. The resignation was sent some time ago to Representative Burton, republican, Ohio, who headed a special house committee to investigate the charges against him, to be tendered immediately if the court should render an adverse decision and was presented to the

house by Speaker Longworth. The Kentucky member reiterated in the letter that he was innocent of the charges against him and predicted that time would vindicate him.

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
