Celebration at T. B. Jones' Home Yesterday Culminates With Wedding Ceremony

Miss Alta L. Jones Becomes Bride of Dr. A. E. Wrightman in Golden Wedding Day of Her Parents

The marriage of Miss Alta L. Jones, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. B. Jones, to Dr. A. E. Wrightman of Silverton at 7 o'clock last evening, came as a fitting culmination to the day of celebration at the Jones' home planned in elaborate detail for the marking of the golden wedding anniversary of the bride's parents. The event was a complete surprise to even the most intimate friends of the couple, even relatives, except the nearest, few, having had no inkling that the day was to close in so festive and happy a manner.

Judge L. H. McMahon performed the marriage rite. The bride was charming in a lovely tailored mode of rosewood point (will, her going away suit, with becoming hat to match. She carried a gorgeous arm bouquet of bride's roses tied with a ribbon of gold.

The service was read in the archway where the parents of the bride had stood at an earlier hour revealing the guests. Garlands of freesias, white for the bride of 1926, combined with golden cassia, signifying the anniversary bride, hung as a background to the improvised altar. A long basket of golden pom pom chrysanthemums, palms, low, potted ferns, and two tiers of golden

candles burning in crystal holders, completed the arch.

Immediately preceding the ceremony, Mrs. W. Carlton Smith sang, "All For You," the guests hardly realizing even then the secret they were to share. As Mrs. Smith finished her song, Miss Myrtle Knowland played the wedding march from Lohengrin's "Bridal Chorus," and the betrothed pair entered arm in arm, exchanging their vows before the guests who had gathered—relatives and the most intimate friends.

The day, itself, with calling hours from 2 to 4 and again from 4 to 6, was a triumph in every way. Mr. and Mrs. Jones received unstinted congratulations, hosts of flowers, and many gifts in token of the anniversary. The entire home was a bower of floral art, early daffodils, magnificent white and gold chrysanthemums, palms, roses, and carnations are only a few of the flowers that filled vases and baskets in every corner. The mantelpieces with long, low baskets of freesias and pink carnations were particularly lovely. In the dining room where the wedding cake was served, garlands of smilax were festooned from the chandelier to the table.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones and their daughter, are all natives of Marion county where hosts of friends are theirs. Mr. and Mrs. Jones were married near old Parkersville at the Coonse home at the head of Lake Umbagog, Mrs. Jones being before her marriage Miss Olive Coonse. As far as the records tell, Mr. and Mrs. Jones have the distinction of being the first Marion county born couple to celebrate the half century mark of wedded life.

Musical numbers during the afternoon were contributed by Mrs. W. Carlton Smith, Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges, and Miss Elizabeth Levy.

Invited to the reception yesterday was the man who attended Mr. Jones as best man 50 years ago—Al McCann of Dallas. Other guests who attended the first wedding are Mrs. Anna Stogmud, Mrs. Sarah Woodington, and Rosella Woodington.

Children born to the union are two sons, Bert L. Jones and S. R. Jones, and the only living daughter, Mrs. A. E. Wrightman (Alta Jones). One daughter and one son passed away—Pearl Jones and W. Al Jones.

Five grandchildren who met to honor their prominent grandparents yesterday afternoon and evening included Creighton and Rosalie Jones, son and daughter of the late W. Al Jones, who was named for Mr. McCann who attended the groom of 1876, and Herbert Jones, Betty Alta Jones, and Alvin Jones. Pearl Jones, a grandchild also, was unable to

come to Oregon for the event. She is a student at the college of Notre Dame, in California.

The old homestead in Mission Bottom where the bridal couple of 50 years ago made their first home is a part of the Shas B. Jones donation claim and still remains in the family's possession.

Mr. and Mrs. Silas B. Jones, father and mother of T. B. Jones, crossed the plains to Oregon in 1856, six years before their son was born. This couple also had the distinction of celebrating their golden wedding anniversary.

Mrs. T. B. Jones (Olive Coonse) was born in Marion county, also, three years after her husband. Her parents, in common with Mr. Jones' parents, were pioneers to Oregon in '50. Her father was one of two brothers who made the trip by prairie schooner in company with their wives. Those who have come after, tell of how they separated at the Snake river, one going to Washington and the other heading straight to the Willamette valley. The brother who chose Washington settled near Centralia and his home became the site where the first civil court in the state convened. This dwelling, due to this fact, has been preserved by the Washington historical society as a state monument. The descendants of the Washington branch of the family use the K instead of the C as the initial letter in their name, a change that was not adopted by the brother who came to Oregon.

It was amid recollections such as the above, in an atmosphere of flowers and congratulations, that one of Salem's best known daughters chose to solemnize her wedding—a nuptial event that will be of wide interest not only in Oregon's capital but also in many towns surrounding.

A wedding supper at 8 o'clock last night closed the festivities of the day, only relatives and the most intimate friends being bidden.
