

World's Heavyweight Match May be Held in Los Angeles on Labor Day

DEMPSEY-WILLS GO IS AGAIN AT STAKE

Promoter Obtains Champion's Promise, But on Three Conditions

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14.—(By Associated Press.)—Jack Doyle, promoter of the Dempsey-Wills fight, today obtained from Jack Dempsey, world's heavyweight champion, a promise to fight Harry Wills ten rounds to a decision for the title in Los Angeles, Labor day, September 6 next, on three conditions.

Dempsey's first two stipulations were that the group of Los Angeles backers whom Doyle represents and who have signified their willingness to underwrite the match up to \$2,000,000, obtain permission to hold the bout in Los Angeles coliseum, and that they show necessary financial ability to carry the deal through.

The champion's other condition was that he be given ten days to permit Floyd Fitzsimmons, South Bend, Ind., promoter, who has been negotiating with him to put up the necessary cash guarantee for a bout in the east, or call that deal off.

Dempsey interjected another stipulation to the effect that the promoters of the Los Angeles bout, should it materialize, donate \$50,000 to the Orthopedic hospital for children here, which he would match with another \$50,000 from his end of the purse.

To all of Dempsey's stipulations Doyle replied, "That's good enough" and the conference closed to await action or the reverse from Fitzsimmons.

NATIONAL MAT GO TO BE OUT SOON

National Wrestling Committee Chairman to Announce Program

CORVALLIS, Jan. 14.—OAC, among several institutions, is favored as the most suitable location for the 1926 national wrestling championships. Final decision will be made by C. W. Streit, chairman of the national wrestling committee at Birmingham, Ala., the later part of this month.

Oklahoma Aggies were awarded the national meet last year and the Oregon Aggies given second consideration with the recommendation that OAC be awarded the meet in 1926.

Requirements outlined by the national wrestling officials have been met at this college, and in view of the fact that OAC was favored last year, it is thought that the Aggies stand a good chance of drawing the meet.

OAC has held the northwest collegiate championship in wrestling since the organization of the sport 14 years ago, which has gained for the college national recognition. Robin Reed, Olympic champion of 1924, is now coach here.

In 1923 and 1924 the national wrestling meets were in Madison Square Gardens, New York City, and this will be the first time, if awarded to the Oregon Aggies, that a national championship affair will be held in Oregon since the Lewis and Clarke exposition in Portland in 1905.

37 BILLS SIGNED

BEARCATS TO FACE WHITMAN TONIGHT

Winner of Game Doped to Be Victim of New Northwest Conference

Willamette university's basketball team will play Whitman this evening at Walla Walla. Outcome of the game will probably show which of the schools is to be champion of the northwest conference for this, the first season of the reorganized conference.

The men left Thursday in good shape for their contest at Walla Walla. They left early in order to have time to practice on the way. The team is pointed for the game, as on it hinges Willamette's chances for the championship.

If Whitman wins, Willamette is practically out of it. If Willamette wins, the reverse is true. Although Pacific and College of Puget Sound are reported to have string teams, they are not considered dangerous. There might be, of course, a dark horse, but according to all dope in sight, Willamette and Whitman are considered the two strongest teams in the conference.

Last year Whitman trimmed Willamette in both games played. The same was true this year here. Whitman also has the advantage of playing the game on their own floor, said to be one of the hardest floors to play on of any school in the conference.

Although tonight's game is considered a crucial one for both teams, they will have no chance at each other when Whitman plays Willamette at Salem on January 26 or 28.

There was a wide difference of opinion as to the decision. One judge voted for Davies, a second for O'Brien while the third called it a draw.

OAC ROOK TOSSERS FACE ACTIVE SKED

Face Salem High School Five at Corvallis Today, One Local Player

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 14.—Wesley Ellis of Salem, is now playing basketball for the rook basketball squad composed of 21 men selected by a process of elimination from aspirants of the freshman class. Ellis has shown up well in early practice and will probably get a chance to show his ability several times during the season, according to Coach Clyde "Cac" Hubbard.

A strong schedule has been arranged by Coach Hubbard. The first year men will have plenty of hard opposition, as none of the teams on the list are considered "easy pickings" for any team in the same class. Ellis will probably play in several of the games of the schedule, which is as follows:

January 15, Salem high school at Corvallis; January 16, Mount Angel college at Corvallis; January 22 Columbia University at Portland; January 23, Franklin high school at Portland. Plans are under way for the scheduling of other games. It is hoped that a return game may be played with Mount Angel college at Mount Angel. Coach Hubbard is also trying to arrange games with Linfield and Albany colleges, but no dates have yet been set.

The OAC-U. of O. freshmen games which are considered the most interesting of the season have not yet been scheduled. This year it is hoped that the two teams will play four games instead of two, as has been the custom in previous years.

Asks That Dempsey's Title Be Revoked by Commission

TOPEKA, Kans., Jan. 14.—(By Associated Press.)—Recommendations that the heavyweight championship be declared vacant "because Jack Dempsey has brought disrepute to boxing throughout the country," were made today by Leslie M. Edmonds to the national boxing association of which he is vice president.

Edmonds, who is also executive secretary of the Kansas Athletic commission suggested that the national association ask the state groups composing it and the affiliated organizations in Europe, North America and South America, to concur in the proposed action.

"Then devise a plan for naming a title holder who will have the respect of the fight fans in America," the vice president concluded in his letter to national headquarters of the boxing commission.

HIGH TAX TALK HIT BY ARTHUR FOSTER

Manager of Land Settlement Department of Portland Chamber Speaks

"When I hear some one say taxes are higher in Oregon than they are in other states it makes me angry," declared Arthur Foster, manager of the land settlement department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, who addressed the Marion-Polk county Realtors yesterday.

"I own land in three or four states, including Oregon. Taxes on my Oregon land are less than anywhere else, yet I receive more benefit from my Oregon land than from any of the others.

"However, there is a way to reduce taxes. That is to bring other men to our state who will be competent producers and tax payers. For the more here to pay taxes, the less the burden for each.

It is the business of Mr. Foster's department to bring "more tax payers." The year round he corresponds with those contemplating coming to Oregon to settle.

"If a man writes telling me he would like to come to Oregon if he could get a job, I try to discourage him. Frankly, the labor market here is full already. We probably discourage more people wanting to come to Oregon than we encourage. What we want are men with some capital who will come, settle on the land, produce, and be an asset to the community.

"If a successful farmer here wants to sell out, we won't help him. We want to do all in our power to keep him here. He is an asset to us. What we do want is to get competent people in here to take the places now eyesores to the communities, and build them into assets.

"Portland business men are selfish in seeking to develop Oregon. They realize that the only way Portland will grow is by building Oregon. In 1924, 22,500 autos stopped at the Portland auto camp. We personally interviewed the parties in each. Out of the number, we located 200 families in Oregon.

"In my experience I have found some men opposed to dealing with those tourists who have been tricked there, and think the whole west has the same calibre realtors.

"When I came to Oregon I was advised not to invest my money until I had been here two or three years and had seen the lay of the land for myself. In other words, I was to trust no realtor. I held my money, didn't invest, and as a result, lost several opportunities to make money. I have found that out since.

"A prospect located and satisfied is the best boost you can get for your community. He will stir up more interest among his eastern friends than a cake of yeast."
