"He's a Prince," With Raymond Griffith, Said Best Here in Many Months

"He's a Prince" serves a double purpose for the big Paramount comedy that opened at the Oregon theater yesterday and will continue on the screen there through today's performances.

He Was Father of W. C. Conner, Editor Northwest Poultry Journal

W. C. Conner, editor of the Northwest Poultry Journal, received a telegram yesterday morning announcing the death of his father at Cottage Grove.

Ira Conner was born in Ohio in 1847 and would have been 79 years of age at his next birthday in September. He was married in Missouri and went to Kansas to reside. In 1875 he went to California with his family and after three years' residence in that state came to Oregon in September, 1878, locating at Cottage Grove, where he engaged in sawmilling for several years. He later engaged in farming in that neighborhood and was for many years associated with the late D. W. Harding in conducting Mr. Harding's 2000 acre stock and grain farm near Cottage Grove. About 20 years ago he bought a farm adjoining the Harding farm upon

which he resided up to the time of his death.

He was a charter member of the Cottage Grove Masonic lodge and was closely identified with the early growth and development of Cottage Grove and community, where he has always been held in the highest esteem.

He is survived by seven sons, three of whom are W. C. of Salem; Edward, Fred, Charles and Rose of Cottage Grove; Horace of Grants Pass and Harry Conner of Eugene.

Funeral services will be conducted at Cottage Grove today.
