Film at Church
"Broken Laws" is the title of the film which has been chosen for use tomorrow night at the regular evening service at the First Congregational church.

In synopsis the plot is as follows: "Broken Laws" is a story about our jazz-mad age. It concerns a mother and son, and the disastrous effect of too much love on the life of this boy. The mother is typical of millions of mothers today, who have all their love on their children. Blind to the child's feelings, she thinks him a paragon of all the virtues, with many a fault. She never reprimands, never scolds, but continually indulges the boy in all his demands.

Her husband remonstrates with her; he sees the change in the boy and is grieved by it. He believes in the old maximum—"Spare the rod and spoil the child." But Joan, his wife, will not let him punish the boy Bobby for any of his misdemeanors. Gradually, through her selfish love for her boy, Joan finds herself losing the love of her husband who has taken to gambling and drink. This is the atmosphere in which little Bobby grows to manhood.

Next door Dick and Muriel is typical of the so-called modern woman. Dick, a book-loving and home-loving soul, in his desire for peace and harmony, has given Muriel full swing and she makes a fine mess of her life—all before her husband's very eyes. And this is the atmosphere in which Patsy, her little daughter and Bobby's dearest friend and pal, grows to womanhood.

The years pass. Ralph Allen dies. Bobby has grown into an arrogant selfish boy, a likeable, albeit lawless youth, a product of our jazz-mad age. Patsy is a typical modern flapper.

Disobeying all laws simply because he had never been taught to respect them, Bobby is sentenced to a term in jail for manslaughter. He has killed an old woman while out joy riding with Patsy.

Heartbroken, Joan the mother, in a scene of stupendous and heart-rending drama, pleads with the judge to let her serve her boy's term in his stead, because it is really she who is guilty.

Bobby is man enough, however, to take his punishment, and at the expiration of the jail sentence he and Patsy and Joan start life again on a surer, finer footing.

SALVATION ARMY REPORTS LABORS

Four Families Aided as Result of Hurry Calls, Statement Details

Following report of the day's activities of the Salvation Army was made last night:

"Four families were helped in one morning by the Salvation Army. One request came from a small community 30 miles distant. Although in another county, Polk, it was a case of need. Two women, one with six children, and the other with a baby. Both husbands were in veterans' hospitals in Portland and Tacoma.

"The Army captain received this request in the morning mail, and by 2 p. m. the same day the family was reached and help given after needs of three Salem families had been met. The groceries with which this last family was helped came from a local woman who had read the Army's appeal for help in yesterday morning's Statesman.

"Foodstuff and anything in the line of vegetables is one of the chief needs at this time, but financial assistance is also necessary, as the Salvationists do not want to engage in a general solicitation for funds before the time of their annual drive which is yet four or five months distant.

RETAIL MERCHANTS MEET FEBRUARY 21

Well Known Speakers to Address Annual State Convention at Eugene

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Jan. 22.—(Special to The Statesman.)—A group of well known speakers have been secured for the annual convention and short course of the State Retail Merchants' association at the university February 21-24. Dean E. C. Robbins of the school of business administration announced today.

Among those who will speak are Marshall N. Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal; Robert C. Line, nationally known authority on retail subjects; Frank B. Conley, president of the Coast Association of Retail Merchants, and several of the school of business administration faculty. Irving Vining of Ashland, president of the State Chamber of Commerce, has been asked to make the closing address.

At the short course of the convention results of the investigation of the school's bureau of research will be given. This is the first year that the short course has had a graduating class, having been formed only four years ago.

Features for the entertainment of delegates are being planned, and on Monday night the Portland wholesalers will give a banquet for the guests. Tuesday night will be the regular convention banquet at which graduation exercises are to be held.

PENALIZE REALTORS FOR LICENSE FAULT

More Than 200 Out of 2,000 Paid \$2.50 Fine for Tardy Application

More than 200 out of 2,000 real estate operators in the state of Oregon were penalized \$2.50 for not obtaining their 1926 licenses before January 10. This was announced yesterday by Will Moore, state real estate commissioner.

The law provides that real estate operators seeking a renewal of their licenses shall pay \$5 per annum, while new operators shall pay \$7.50 per year. Under a ruling of the state real estate commissioner applicants who applied for 1926 licenses after January 10 were considered as new operators and not entitled to the \$5 rate accorded renewals.

The real estate commissioner estimated that his ruling would increase the receipts of the department approximately \$500 this year.
