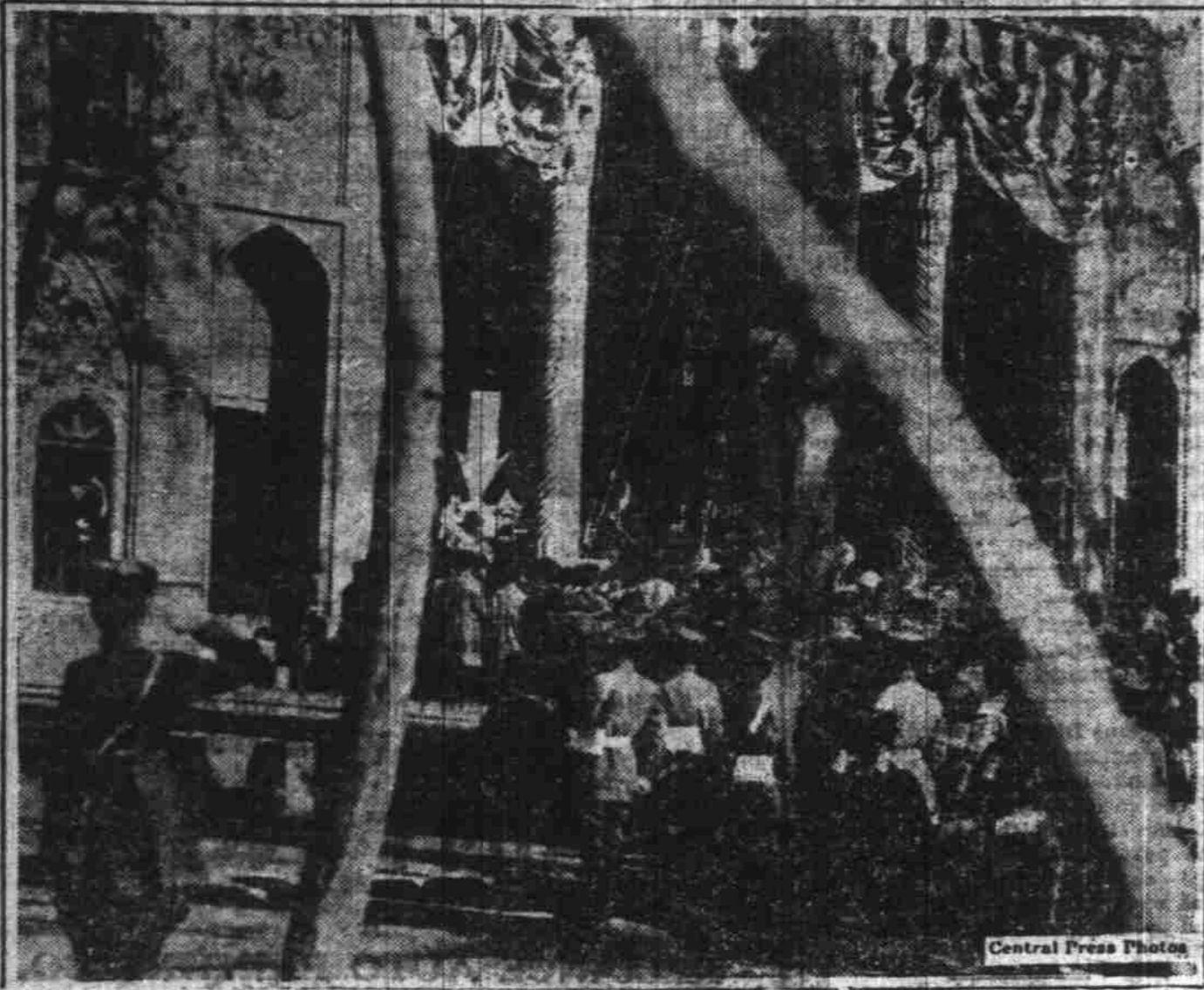


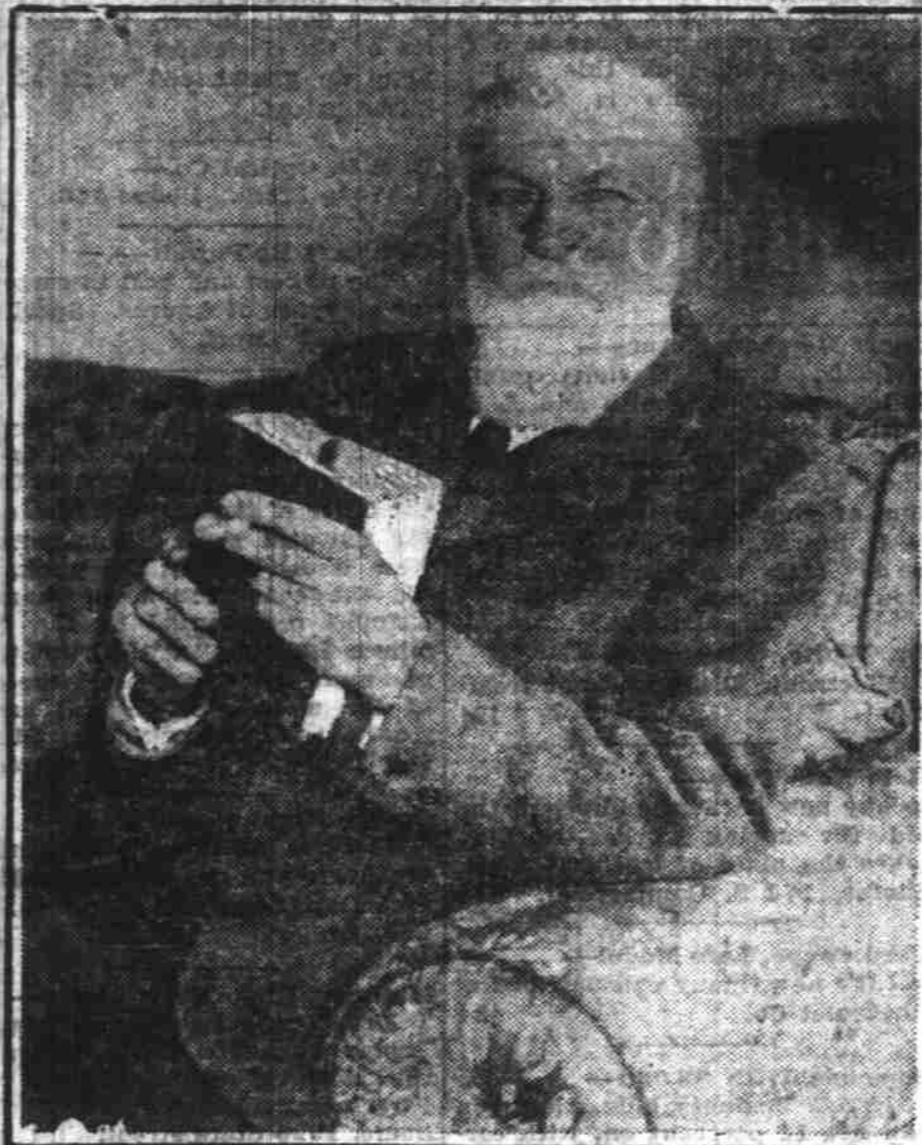

The photo shows Reza Shah (indicated by arrow) seated on the marble throne which he had just mounted a few minutes before the picture was snapped. The day preceding this he had been carried from the parliament building, scene of his election, to his palace in a golden carriage.

Berlin's Bride Happy in This Photo, Divorced Mother Forgives, 'Tis Saia



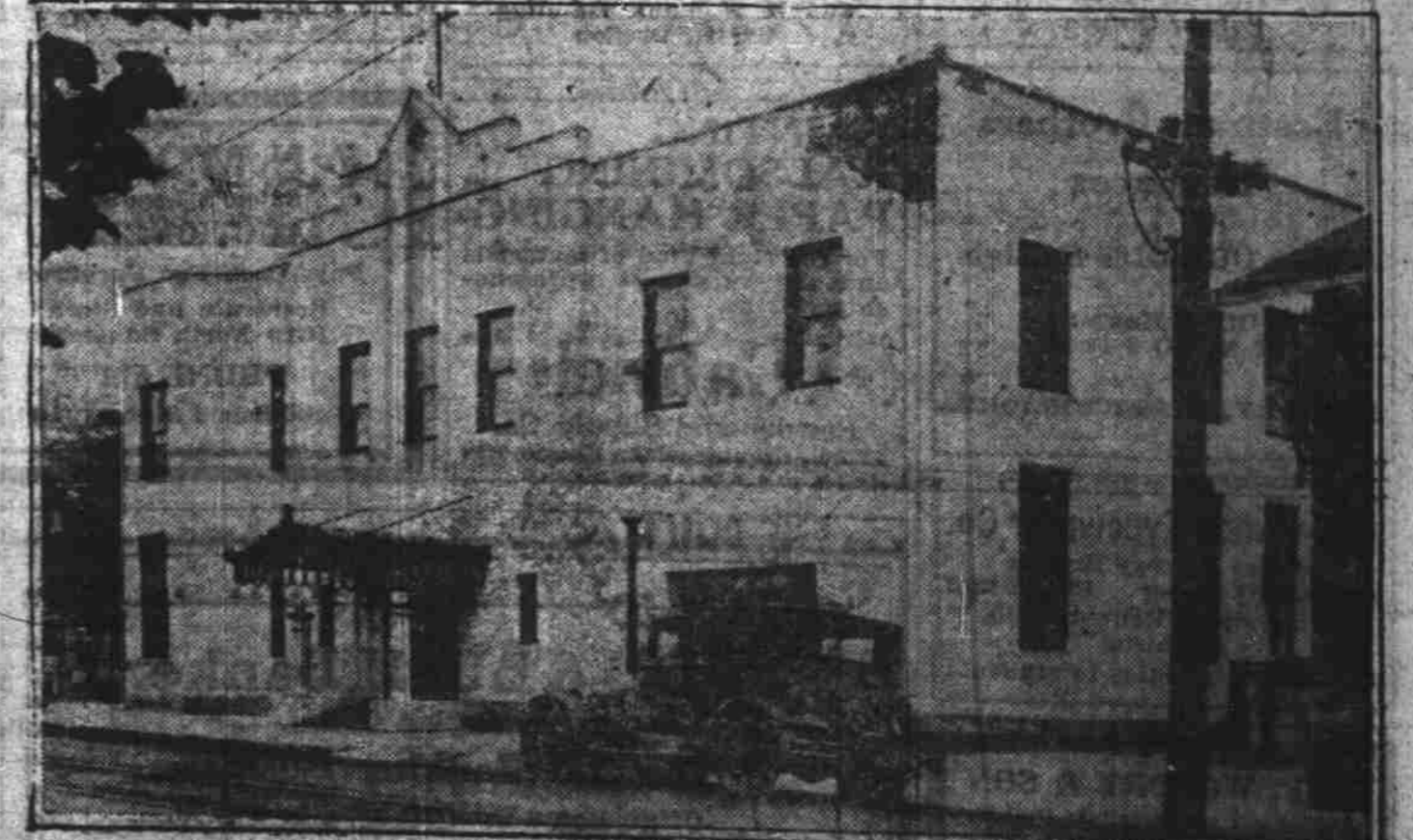
