

Albany Match Delayed When Jones Fails to Weigh In, Reed Defeated

ROBIN GETS FIRST FALL, THEN LOSES

Utah Wrestler Places Forfeit to Meet Local Again at 148 Pounds

Henry Jones won from Robin Reed by taking two falls in a flashy match at the Albany armory last night. Reed was at a disadvantage when Jones caused him to come down to 145 pounds. However, Reed took the first fall and Jones the two remaining falls, the last one with a leg split, in about nine minutes.

A return match is to be arranged during the next two weeks, with both men weighing 148 pounds. Reed then will have a chance to make his weight.

Reed took the first fall in 22 minutes by a headlock with some of the most brilliant wrestling that has ever been shown on the Albany mat. He met Jones with action and in the melée headlocks, toeholds and body scissors came in aplenty.

The wrestlers did mix, as testified by the teeth which were loosened in Jones' mouth. Part of the gold work was jarred loose and he will have to make way to the dentist. Nevertheless, he put up a good struggle, even if the house was against him.

The main event opened with a squabble over the weight question. Reed had made the welterweight of 145 pounds as requested by Henry Jones, but when the time came for Jones to step on the scales he refused to do this. For several minutes he held the match to a standstill by not ceding to the demands of the commission.

Reed had an even break with Jones during the second fall. He fell into the deadly hold when he endeavored to pick the Utah wrestler from the mat. When they fell the hold was waiting for him and it was but little time for Jones to clamp the scissors on Reed's head.

In the excuse offered to the fans, Jones declared that he did not have a chance to make his weight, and that he did not say anything about him coming down to the welterweight.

This excuse did not go well with the crowd which booed the Utah man, and cheered the Aggie mentor when he stated that the match would go on at the handicap.

In the third and deciding fall, Jones appeared to be the stronger. He was slower in coming out of the holds, although he could evade some of the airplane spins. One in particular, he broke by making a wild plunge for the side, which made the way clear for him.

The curtain raiser was a small thriller when Ted Lindley and Teddy Keiser, 8, two fifty pounders went for three two minute boxing rounds. They were clever at their stuff and brought down the house.

The hot blast burned off most of their clothing.

For more than six hours after the explosion, several scores of rescuers from nearby mines penetrated the thick smoke, bringing out overcome and burned men.

When thirty-three men had been saved alive, it was reported that all the miners had been saved but a check later revealed three others were missing.

The rescue parties again plunged into the tunnel and found the bodies of three miners who had been assigned to clean out an old working, far back in the mine tunnel. Two of the victims were found sitting down, their tools nearby.

CHICAGO, Jan. 29.—(By Associated Press.)—Rock dust prepared and placed as an accident prevention measure smothered an explosion today in the world's greatest coal mine and turned what otherwise might have been a serious disaster with 1,225 men underground, into a minor accident which cost five lives. The accident occurred in the New Orient mine of the Chicago, Wilmington and Franklin Coal company at West Frankfort, Ill.

Albany and Delbert Reeves Post Squads Scheduled for Fast Game

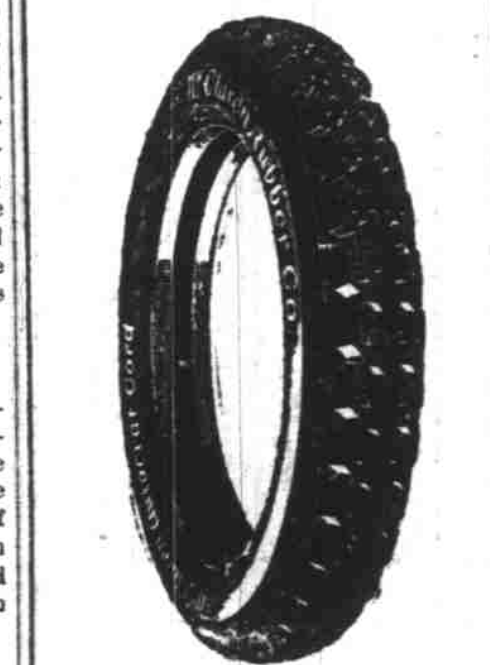

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OREGON TOSSERS PILE UP VICTORY

Return With Wins Over Washington, Montana, Idaho and State Fives

EUGENE, Jan. 29.—(Special.) The Oregon basketball team returned from Pullman today where it wound up its northern trip with a victory over Washington, Montana, Idaho and Washington state. The Webfooters are now preparing for their game with Washington here Saturday night.

Perhaps one reason Oregon has done so well away from home is the consistency with which Okerberg, center, Gunther forward, and Westergren, guard, have been able to connect with the basket. This trio is far in the lead in conference scoring.

Okerberg, with 21 field goals and 11 converted foul throws, for a total of 53 points is the outstanding scorer of the conference. Gunther has connected with one more basket, but converted seven foul throws less and has a total of 48 points. Season's scores by the Oregon players follow:
