Daughters of the American Revolution Hold State Board Meeting

Fifty-seven representatives of Oregon societies of the Daughters of the American Revolution, including 19 members of the local

chapter, were in Corvallis Wednesday for the annual state board meeting in session throughout the day. With Mrs. Seymour Jones of Salem, state regent, presiding, the members of the board discussed various phases of the chapter work preparatory to the annual state convention to be held in Portland March 25 to 27, with Multnomah chapter women as hostesses.

Miss Anne Lang of The Dalles, past regent of the Oregon Daughters and national vice president, was the speaker of the day and told the delegation of Memorial National hall in Washington, D. C. maintained by the national organization. Because of its limited seating capacity, a new auditorium is to be added to Memorial hall, and the state officers voted to recommend to the state conference that Oregon Daughters purchase a box in the new auditorium for which they will subscribe \$1500. Should the plan be approved, the box would bear the name "Oregon."

Mrs. B. L. Steeves, chairman of the department of Revolutionary relics, described the exhibit she has gathered together from over the state to be placed in a case set aside for that purpose in the state house. It is the plan to place there mementoes of Revolutionary days of unusual historical value.

Oregon Daughters will edit the March issue of the Oregon Magazine, published monthly in Salem. In that issue, it was agreed, articles concerning the various Oregon chapters will be included with an account of the first DAR organization in Oregon, another of the national organization, pres-

ent-day activities of the society, a story of the Old Oregon Trail by Mrs. Mary Barlow Wilson, and other stories of Oregon that are of educational and historical merit. The March edition will sell at 25 cents per copy.

A report of the society's work in connection with the state department of education was given by Mrs. Clyde Lewis of Portland. Mrs. W. W. McCready, regent of Willamette chapter, Portland, told of the work of that chapter in the veterans' hospital in Portland. Mrs. H. W.
