DRIVING GALES HIT MAINLAND

Baking Winds and Rainstorms Expected to Continue in Pacific Area

Oregon and Washington Said to Be in Stationary "Center" of Storm; Disabled Ships in Tow

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3.—(By Associated Press.)—The storm that has held the Pacific in its grip for the past two days is still riding rough shod over a vast stretch of the mainland and an equally vast area of the ocean tonight and threatening to unleash more raking gales before it is broken up.

A survey of the shipping, the storm area, however, reveals no vessels in distress and discloses that all efforts to succor stricken craft have been successful.

The storm is "stationary" off the Pacific northwest, the United States weather bureau said, meaning that its head is stationary, while it is continuing to send out blistering gales and driving drenching rains on every flank. Part of the disturbance is extending southward again and high winds and heavy rains are to resume in this region, perhaps as far south as Point Reyes.

Prostrated telegraph wires delayed any wind velocity report from Point Reyes today, although it was known to be much calmer there than yesterday.

The Standard Oil tanker, Capt. A. F. Lucas, with the battered schooner Ecola in tow, is bearing toward San Francisco from off Point Bragg, 130 miles toward the north where the Ecola, crippled and derelict, with a crew of 12 and the skipper's wife aboard, fought a gallant battle of two days with smashing, tearing wind and waves. The Lucas put a line aboard at 3:15 a. m. today, after standing by the stricken Ecola throughout the night.

Old-time mariners said it was the heaviest blow in 25 years on the Pacific.
